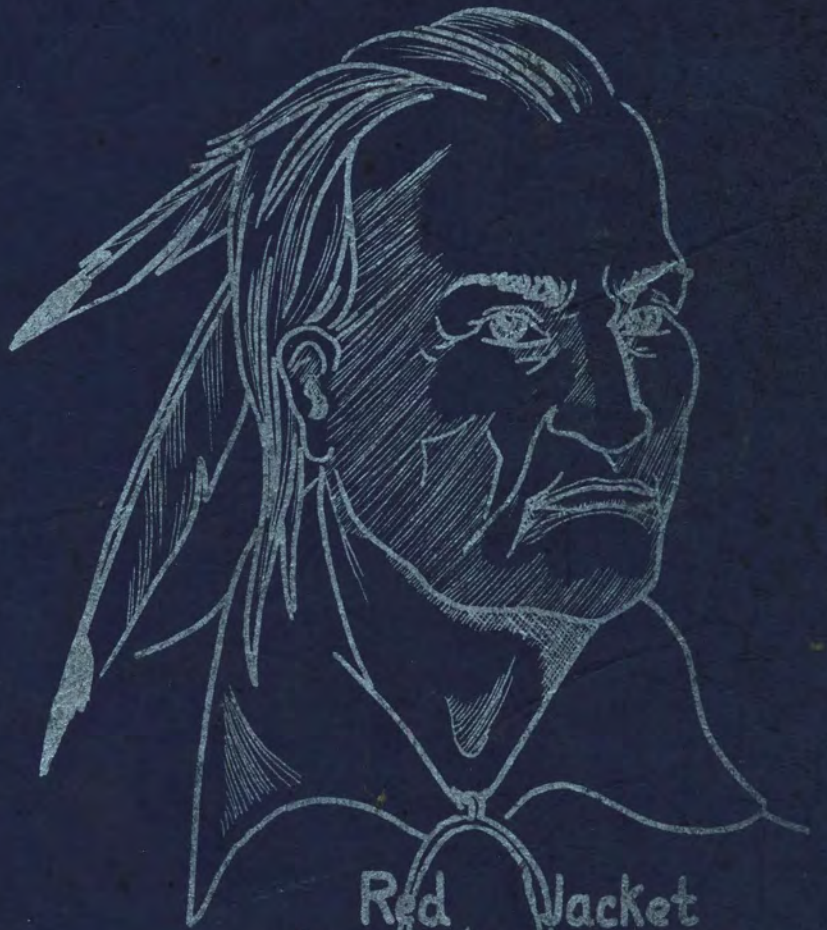

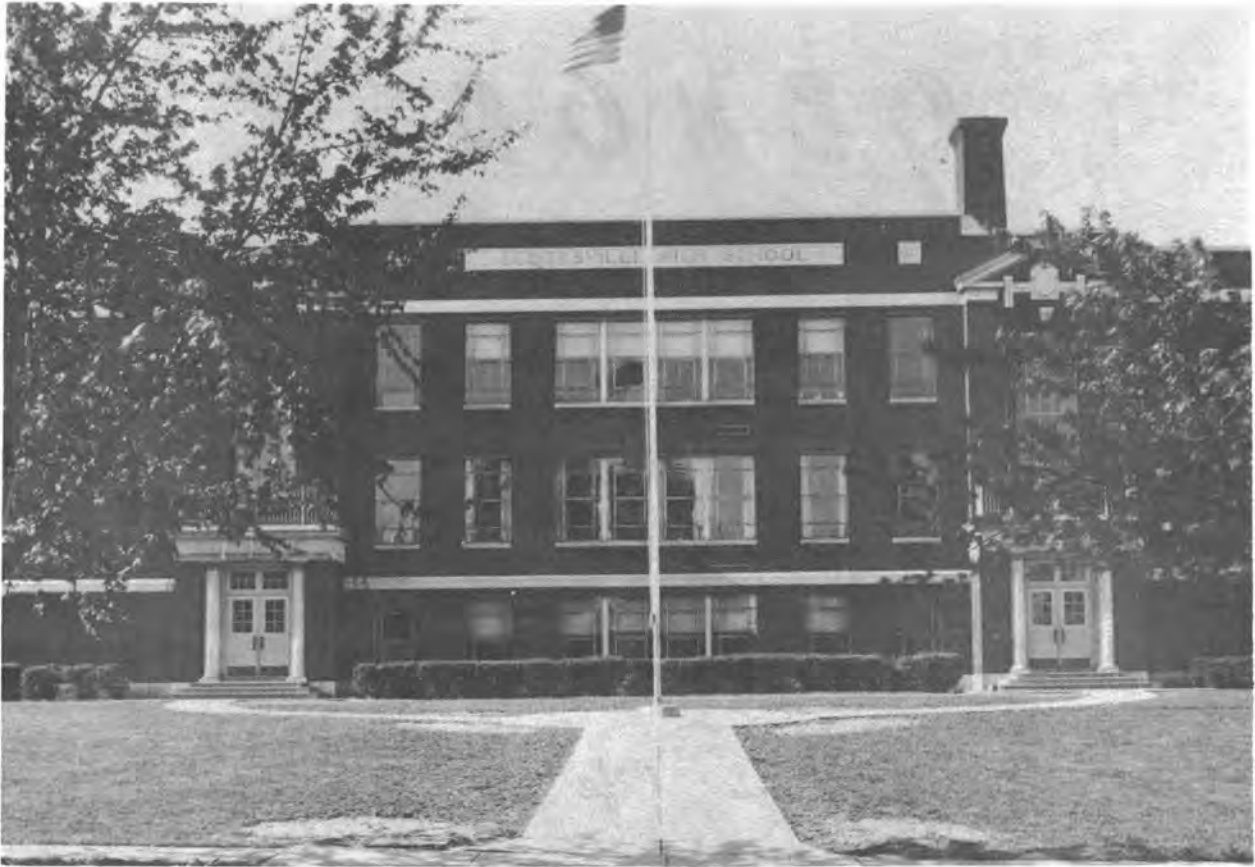

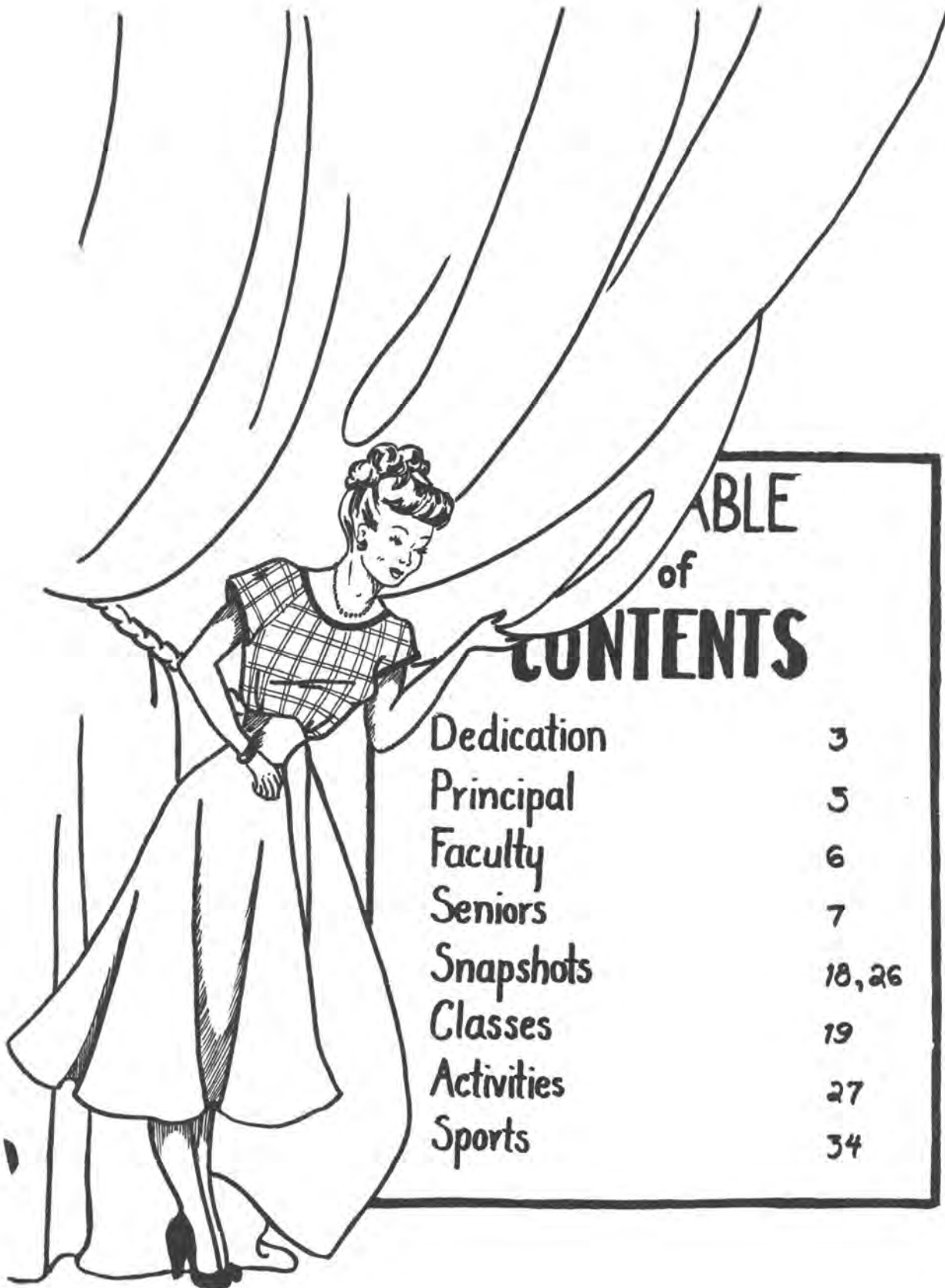

Oh yes! Wally wasn't able to attend either. You see after he was graduated from high school he enrolled at Buffalo University and is now studying for his final exams.

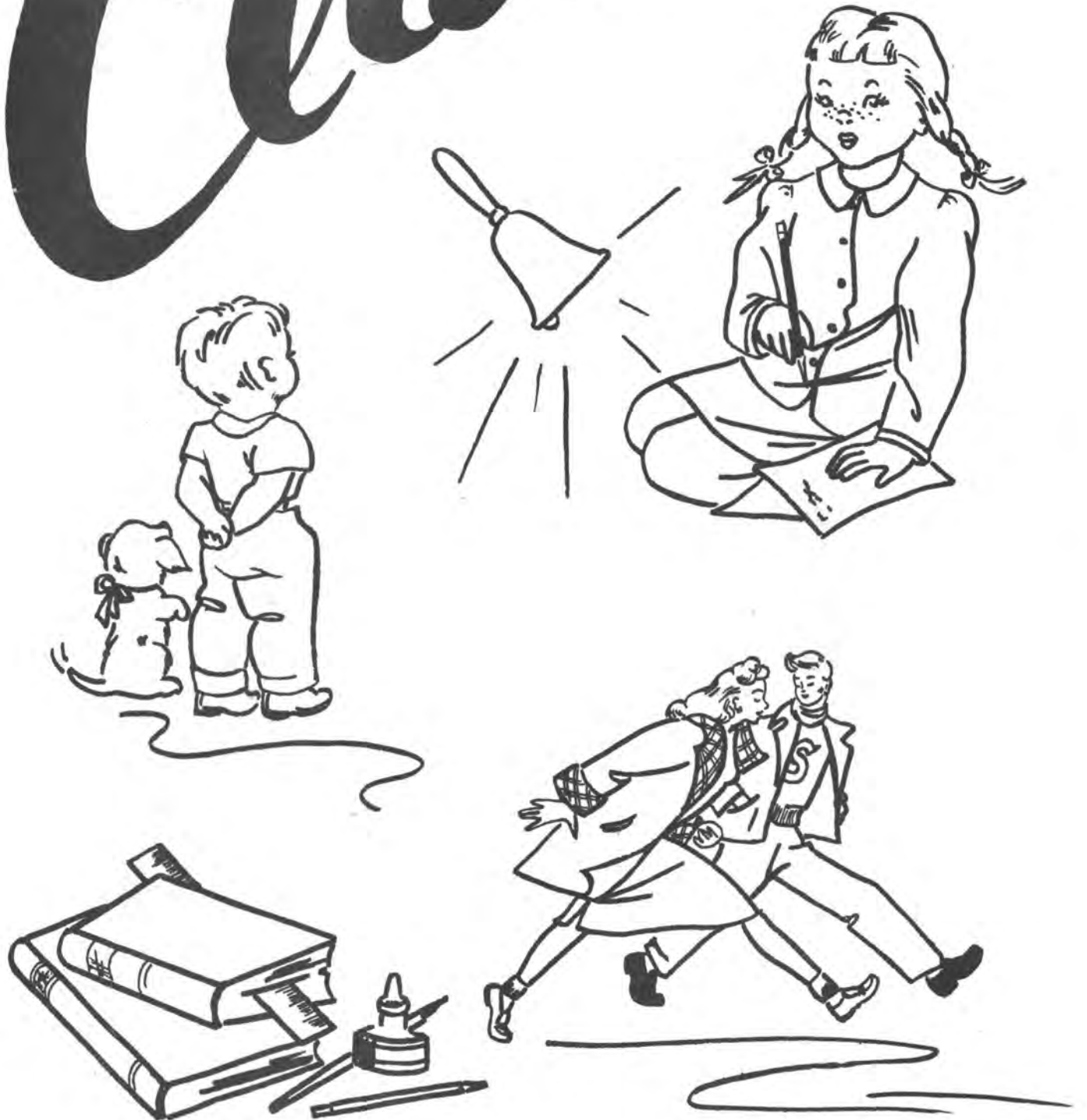
I must say good-bye for now for I have to go out and attend to my patients. I have quite a large veterinary practice and it takes a great deal of my time.

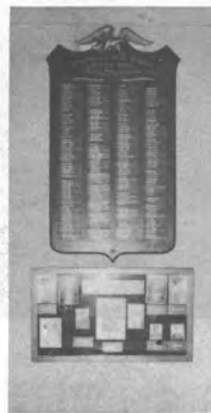
