KODACTOR

For our next production, we have scheduled the smash Broadway comedy, "Plaza Suite", by Neil Simon. The play will be presented in the Camera Club Theatre in Bldg. 28 on Mar. 10-11 and 17-18. The audience response to our last Camera Club production was overwhelmingly in favor of the two-weekend schedule, so we will plan our shows that way whenever possible. Tickets, at 75¢ each go on sale at KPAA Offices on Monday, February 7. Get yours early so you won't be disappointed.

This fifth consecutive hit by Neil Simon has only recently been released for amateur production, following a 2-year run on Broadway and several touring productions. We will certainly be among the first amateur groups to produce "Plaza Suite" continuing a long and highly successful Kodactor - Neil Simon tradition. Past examples include such shows as "Barefoot In The Park", "The Odd Couple", and last season's "The Star-Spangled Girl".

Plaza is actually a Suite of three separate plays, each concerned with a day in the life of a suite in New York's Plaza Hotel. The first play, to be directed by Kathy Kelly, introduces us to a suburban couple who take the suite while their house is being painted. It turns out to be the same one they occupied on their honeymoon 23 (or was it 24?) years ago - and is today their anniversary, or will it be tomorrow? Carol Durgin will direct the second segment which shows us a successful Hollywood producer in New York on business. Seeking a little diversion, he calls up a childhood sweetheart, now a local suburban housewife who has idolized him from afar in the intervening years. The blockbuster third scene presents a mother and father frantically attempting to get their daughter out of the bathroom and down to the ballroom where her wedding party awaits. John Sheehan will direct this wild and uproarious farce.

We are also looking ahead to our May production of "Mister Roberts" to be directed by Betty Miller. At this time we are calling for help with costumes. The scene is a U.S.

The small seeds are not covered and the larger seeds are hidden by a light cover of moss. When the seeds are sown, set the tray in shallow water until soaked. Drain and slip the tray into a plastic bag to be left until the seeds show green. Then remove from the plastic cover and water as needed. When the first true leaves grow, the plants are ready to be set into another container about two inches apart. Here they will grow until ready to be transplanted outdoors.

Before planting your garden, a period of hardening is required. About April 15, set outside in a cold frame. Remove the cover on warm days but cover well on cold nights. If you have room, place the cover on a blacktop driveway which draws heat during the day and, when covered, keeps the plants warm at night. Be careful not to let the plants get wind-whipped before they are set out in the garden.

Try marigolds first, then the petunias and lobelias and, perhaps, tuberos begonias.

Many other practiced suggestions are available from your garden club.



ICE FISHING OUTING

Our annual ice fishing outing will be held at Conesus Lake Saturday, February 5, the weather permitting. This is always a popular spot for local anglers and, with Dennis Morgan as chairman, it should be a great event.

Dennis will set up the weigh-in station at the State Boat Launching Site off the East Lake Road some 6 miles south of Lakeville. Hot chocolate, coffee and some cookies will be freely dispensed to all KPAA members and their families during the official weigh-in hours from 1 to 3 p.m. To be eligible for prizes, you are asked to pre-register before 2 p.m. Friday, Feb. 4, in the KPAA Offices.



Contestants may fish anywhere on Conesus Lake. If you are seeking a big northern pike, these can be caught on large golden shiners or chubs using underwater reel-type tip-ups set near the shoreline over water 6-to-14 feet deep. Walleyes usually prefer minnows or large jigs fished a foot or so off bottom near the drop-offs in 25-to-35 feet of water (see Jan. '72 R&G News). Big perch can be taken by jigging small brass or silvery lures just off the bottom all the way across the lake. The hook on the perch jig should be baited with wigglers, mousee grubs, a perch eye, or a juicy oakleaf bug for best results. These fish often travel in schools so you may have to drill a string of holes before you hit the jackpot.

Local bait and tackle shops are now stocked up with all the necessary gear for ice fishing. We recommend that you see them during the week if you need some help with "How do you do it?" They will likely be too busy dishing out the bait on Friday or Saturday to discuss fishing methods in detail. However, they will always do their best to help

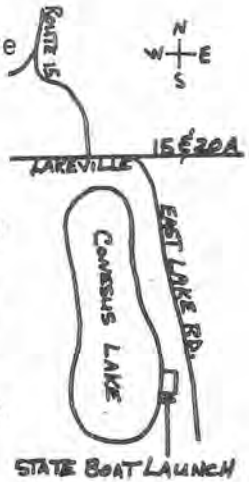

When you arrive at the lake, BE SURE that you park your car well off the pavement as the sheriff and state troopers are under strict orders to enforce the parking rules along these busy highways. The law also prohibits blocking driveways to any cottage or building as well as the use of wind-breaks out on the lake. Some areas along the roads have been torn up this fall due to the construction of the new sewer line around the lake, so watch for soft spots and pot holes hidden under the snow piles.

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE 1971 ROD & GUN CLUB WINNERS

The winners of the 1971 KPAA Rod & Gun Club's Fishing, Pheasant Tail, and Deer Antler Contests were announced at the Winter Show January 7. In all, there were 34 beautiful trophies passed out to the lucky winners rewarding their expertise in the art of angling, gunning, and archery.

According to Ed Batog, Fishing Contest chairman, there were 86 entries representing 12 different species. Heaviest competition was in the smallmouth bass division with 21 entries coming mostly from the St. Lawrence River. Ed also pointed out that many Kodak anglers tangled with some top trophy - sized fish as the facts testify - 41 lb. carp, 33 lb. muskie, a lake trout that weighed 18 lbs. as it came from the water, a 12 lb. rainbow, a 12 lb. walleye, a 5 lb. smallmouth bass, a 6 lb. brook trout, a 25 lb. northern pike, a 4 lb. brown trout, and rock bass and perch that went over a pound apiece.

The extra measure of good health, happiness, and companionship that this outdoor sport brings to many Kodak families is beyond anyone's guess. So for a bonus, our 1972 Fishing

Contest will be expanded to include coho and chinook salmon fishermen and the competition for these giants of the fresh water should be most interesting.

The pheasant tail contest drew 18 entries. This year's crop of birds grew some fine plumage as the winning tail feather measuring almost 24 inches.

Deer hunting was considerably tougher than in the past, if the number of entries this year is any indication. There were only two lucky archers who brought in a set of horns, and four gunners who racked up kills big enough for a measurement. The biggest antler was in the firearms division and it came to 154 1/8 points, a fine trophy for decorating any sportsman's wall. We hope that the mild winter, combined with a better food supply, will produce bigger deer herds and better racks next fall.

Tell your hunting and fishing friends to save the date of Friday night, March 10, when our Spring Show will bring outdoor photographer Howard Shelley with several outstanding wildlife films that have received 'excellent ratings' from the editors of OUTDOOR LIFE.

The February meeting of the KPAA Coin Club will be held Thursday, February 10, at 7:30 p.m. in room 48 of Building 28. Our guest speaker for the evening will be Ed Quagliana whose topic will be Colonial coins. Ed is a past president of the Empire State Numismatic Association and the Rochester Numismatic Association and is highly knowledgeable on colonial issues as well on many other areas of numismatics. Join Ed and the rest of us on a trip through this country's early numismatic history.

It looks like the mint has done it again! Some 1971 Proof Sets (1,655 according to mint officials) were produced with an s-less nickel, so check your sets again for a missing mint-mark. The 1970 sets with the s-less dime (2200 total) are retailing at \$400 to \$500!

Much discussion in numismatic circles these days is centered on the upcoming sale of silver dollars to be held by the Treasury. A number of bags of silver dollars of 19th century vintage, (so-called Morgan-type) the majority of which bear the CC mint-mark of the Carson City Mint, were never put into circulation. The government is now making plans to sell these coins at nearly retail numismatic value on a rather complicated bid basis. One important point is that the first bids will not begin to be accepted before January of 1973. We will attempt to keep you up to date on further developments on this subject with details of the coins and bidding procedure in further issues.

The auction following the regular meeting will feature Jefferson Nickels.

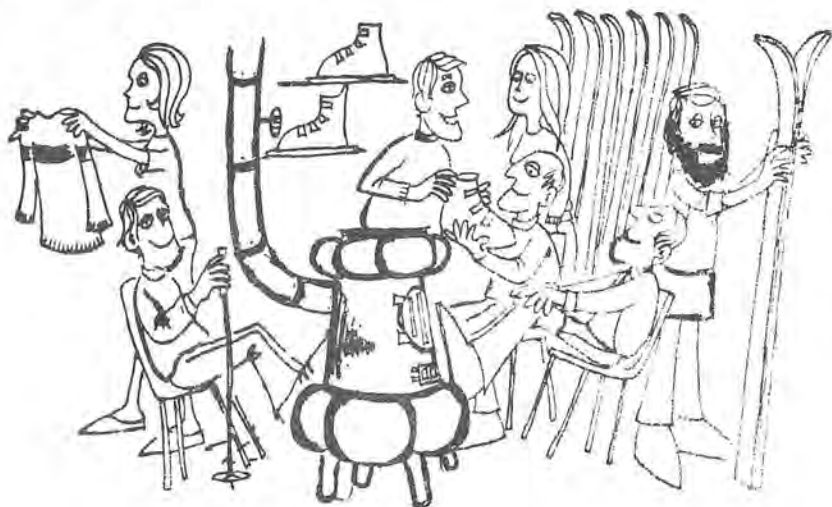


Hi Skiers!

For our next production, we have scheduled the smash Broadway comedy, "Plaza Suite", by Neil Simon. The play will be presented in the Camera Club Theatre in Bldg. 28 on Mar. 10-11 and 17-18. This fifth consecutive hit by Neil Simon has only recently been released for amateur production, following a 2-year run on Broadway and several touring productions. Past examples include such shows as "Barefoot In The Park", "The Odd Couple", and last season's "The Star-Spangled Girl".

The blockbuster third scene presents a mother and father frantically attempting to get their daughter out of the bathroom and down to the ballroom where her wedding party awaits. John Sheehan will direct this wild and uproarious farce.
