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ROSE and GARDEN CLUB



Now is an excellent time to sharpen pruning shears and grass-trimming shears with a file.

Follow the old cutting edge until a sharp edge appears. Try them on a piece of paper or cloth. Put a light coating of oil on them to prevent rusting and to make them work easier.

Rotary lawn mower blades can also be sharpened. Be sure to remove the same amount of metal from each side to maintain balance. It is also a good

idea to tighten the nuts and bolts on the mower. Put a new spark plug in and change the oil in the crankcase according to instructions that came with the mower.

For a touch of spring ahead of time: Prune some branches of pussy willows and forsythia to force into bloom. Put the cuttings in a pail of warm water overnight. Then place them into a plastic bag with a piece of sponge or cloth containing a few drops of household ammonia. Leave as is for three days in the basement. Then remove the cuttings from plastic bag and place in pail of water until they start to bloom. At this time, bring them upstairs and place in a vase of water to which you may add a small piece of charcoal to sweeten the water. Now watch them bloom.

Curtain going up!! It's only a few days until show time "Plaza Suite", the Kodactor's first production of 1972, has its opening night on Friday, Mar. 10, in the Camera Club Theater. Additional performances are scheduled for Saturday, Mar. 11, as well as Friday and Saturday, Mar. 17 and 18. Scheduling this way provides four weekend evenings for performances. However, tickets, at 75¢ each, are going fast and we expect they will soon be gone. So, if you don't have yours yet, hurry to the KPAA Office and get them. Don't be disappointed.

"Plaza Suite" is Neil Simon's fifth consecutive Broadway hit and perhaps the grandest of them all. It is actually a suite of three plays which, to quote the critics, in ensemble compose "a wonderfully happy and gratifying evening of sheer entertainment" or, individually, are "richly funny".

The first play, to be directed by Kathy Kelly, introduces us to a suburban couple who take a suite at the Plaza while their house is being painted, and it turns out to be the same one in which they honeymooned 23 (or was it 24?) years ago - and was yesterday the anniversary, or is it today? A wry tale of marriage in tatters starring Marcia Hartman and Buryle Marvin. Playing supporting roles will be Vivian Dorscheid, Mike Finear and Erik Anderson.

The second tale shows us a top-drawer Hollywood producer who after three marriages is looking for fresh fields, and so calls up a childhood sweetheart, now a suburban housewife, for a little diversion. In the intervening years she has idolized him from afar, and is now more than the match he bargained for. Carol Durgin will direct Eileen Keegan and Sam Donley in their starring roles.

The last scene shows us the same suite, with a mother and father fighting between themselves over the best way to get their daughter out of the bathroom and down to the ballroom where the guests await her-or as mama yells, "I want you to come out of the bathroom and get married!"

John Sheehan directs Arlene Miller and Don Curran in this madcap adventure. Marti and Dave Rigby play the intended bride and groom.

Since all three segments are delightful, it is a matter of taste as to which you will enjoy the most. Don't forget, Mar. 10, 11, 17, 18 in the Camera Club Theater. Get your tickets in advance at the KPAA Office.

Our KPAA Rod & Gun Club's SPRING Show Friday Night March 10 will star wildlife movie-maker and lecturer Howard Shelley with a superb set of color films on hunting and fishing.

For the sportsman afield, his "Hunter's Moon" pictures some great mule deer and antelope hunting in the Big Horn Mountains of Wyoming as well as in the colorful Black Hills and Badlands of the Dakotas, big game hunting in the vast primitive areas of Idaho's Salmon River Country, and spectacular action along the fabulous eastern slopes of the MacKenzie Mountains not far from Great Bear Lake and the Arctic Circle.



As for the fisherman, his eyeballs should pop at the sight of a giant lake trout almost five feet long weighing about 60 lbs., colorful brook trout ready to smash at almost any lure dropped into foam-tossed waters emptying into Hudson Bay, spectacular grayling and arctic char fishing in Canada's Northwest Territory, salmon in Alaska, and much, much more.

This stacks up to be one of the best evening's entertainment you've seen all year. The program gets underway at 7:30 PM sharp with a fast-moving cartoon, followed by lots of fish and game. All this action will take place in the Kodak Recreation Center, Bldg. 28, and the tickets, still priced at 25¢, are being sold in the KPAA offices on a first come - first served basis. Since the Shelleys travel-trailered through much of the country while making these films, there should be plenty of spots for humor.

It looks like a busy time for anglers of all ages as we prepare for the big opener. It's a gay & festive occasion - one I'd hate to miss.

The antenna is the one item that is regulated only by what you can put up in the air and keep there; it is also the single most important item in your amplification chain and can surely make that mouse roar; so our topic is an apt one.

Roy Bloom and Al Wise will both demonstrate and explain the use of two significant advances in determining how an antenna is operating, the now familiar VSWR Bridge, and the less familiar but equally useful noise bridge. The latter device is the most important thing to come along in a long time for those interested in the gain of an antenna as a receiving device and its demonstration should be of interest to all our members. Come to our March meeting for the details.
