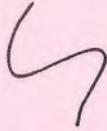

# ROSE and GARDEN CLUB



As you know by now, many of the hard chemicals previously used by the home gardener are now banned.

The Co-operative Extension Service publishes information for landscapers and garden centers, pointing out that the following recommendations for 1972 may be followed:

Use Chlordane if you have it available in the new 5% granular form (use 2 pounds per 1,000 square feet) and if your lawn is located in the normal European chafer area (west of the Genesee River and south of a line drawn from Ballantyne Bridge through Powder Mill Park with the exception of some areas in Greece and Gates.)

If grubs are not present treatment will not be required until Aug. 1 through Aug. 15. If Chlordane is used, treatment should not be necessary for 3-5 years or until resistant chafers move in. If Chlorpyrifos or Diazinon are used, treatment will be necessary in August.

Treatment for billbugs and sod webworms should not start until their activity is noted, usually in early June.

The only Chlordane that can presently be sold to consumers for their own use is 5% granular, 5% dust and 44% emulsifiable concentrate. However, one having a B permit can purchase and use Chlordane that is 12% granular, 40% wettable powder, and 72% - 75% emulsifiable concentrate.

## START MAKING COMPOST SOON

Select an out-of-the-way place in the yard hidden by plantings if possible. Dig a shallow hole if the land is well-



drained, otherwise build it above ground using three or four tiers of cement block and laying it loosely.

Organic material, such as lawn clippings, leaves, table scraps, sod, sawdust, weeds and garden plants may be accumulated. Soil in small amounts from the garden is helpful and water is a must. Sprinkle when the materials become dry.

Turning will add air to the heap and help break it down. A two-year wait is in order if you do not stir it. At the beginning of the third year, you may dig into the bottom, adding it to your garden or mixing one part with your potting soil.

To swell the heap, use woodchips, coffee and tea grounds, adding lime if it is available. From time to time, sprinkle a small amount of fertilizer on the pile.

# ROD 'n' GUN

With the opening of the bass and muskie season on June 18, all fish hereabouts become fair game for the angler's hook.

From the number of entries in our KPAA Rod & Gun Club's Fishing Contest last year, black bass were by far the most popular target. The St. Lawrence River and the shoals along the eastern tip of Lake Ontario produced a record number of entries and the prospects appear unusually bright for a repeat performance this year.

However, record-sized bass are by no means limited to these waters. Lurking in the thousands of farm ponds that dot the landscape are some real lunkers. Not to be overlooked either are the water-filled rock and gravel quarries scattered about the countryside. Sizeable bass can also be found in the lakeshore ponds and bays, the Genesee and Seneca Rivers, Oak Orchard Creek, the Barge Canal, and of course the Finger Lakes Region and Canada.

Almost any good fishing spot can be home for a big bass just waiting for you to drop a juicy bait in front of its hungry jaws. Fishermen both young and old seem to get the most fun out of this type of fishing if they use light tackle. From past experience, a good spinning rod and reel is hard to beat. This outfit can be rigged for bait fishing by tying a #4 or #6 gold hook directly to the end of the monofilament line. For weight, a couple of split-shot are crimped on the line about a foot above the hook. The most productive bass baits used locally are soft-shelled crabs, minnows, worms and bass bugs in that order of preference.

Soft-shells should be hooked through the tail, minnows through the lips, nightcrawlers and bass bugs through the collar near their heads.

Established bait dealers, boat livery operators, as well as fish and game officers, are usually able to give some helpful tips on where to find these fish. Once you arrive at "The Spot", cast out your offering and let it settle to the bottom before you begin a slow, inching-type retrieve toward the boat.

Hopefully, you won't have long to wait before a hungry bass grabs your bait and tries to take off in a shower of spray. These fish can be ferocious biters when in the mood, and where there is one, there should be more.



When the action fades or is non-existent, up-anchor and drift your crab or minnow over an underwater shoal preferably where there are lots of rocks and the water is between 10 and 30 feet deep. Electronic depthfinders or fish locators are very valuable for this purpose. In all likelihood, you will need to add more split-shot to your line in order to get the drifting bait down to where the fish are lurking.

For the anglers who prefer to use artificials, small dark-colored bucktail jigs do well when fished with an erratic lift-n-drop pattern as they are bumped along the bottom. Small minnow-like lures and spinners fastened on a leader a couple of feet behind a trolling sinker have always been good bait. In recent years, plastic worms with weighted heads have been effective especially in southern waters.

One angler I know uses only a small floating popper and a medium-stiff fly rod to get his bass. His technique is to carefully work his boat along the shoreline, fishing those productive pockets between the weed beds. He always seems to have good luck especially late in the afternoon 'till dark.

Another ardent angler I know is Ben Moss of the Bldg. 31 Power Dept. who does most of his fishing with only a pair of homemade 'quill' minnows. These small lures are worked in tandem about a foot apart at the end of a light spinning outfit.



Ben makes his artificial minnows from big turkey quills which he collects from farmer friends each fall. The quills are cut in  $3/4$ -to- $1\frac{1}{2}$  inch lengths, and painted inside with a metallic-type finish. A long-shanked hook is inserted through the tubing of the quill so that the hook-eye sticks out from one end and the barb from the other. A tuft of nylon or

blacktail hair is inserted at the hook end and the cavity of the quill is poured full of a special low-melting, solder-type metal similar to "Herter's Easy-Melt Metal". This holds everything together as well as adding rigidity and weight to the lure.

Properly handled, these quill minnows are real killers. If you have any questions about these lures, you can reach Ben Moss at K.P. extension 73129.

Have a wonderful vacation this summer but make sure that you and your family observe the safety rules and regulation around water. Check your lifesaving gear and give a few moments of serious thought as to how YOU would attempt to rescue an exhausted person floundering in rough water. Just trying to haul a helpless person into your boat can be extremely difficult at best.

The crackle of lightning on a portable radio is a good storm warning device which small-craft operators should heed to seek a safe mooring spot. On rare occasions, violent winds have been known to suddenly sweep out of a clear blue sky due to the approach of a strong weather front. More often, these unpredictable winds will accompany or follow within an hour the passing of a thunderstorm. Some times heavy gusts will veer more than 90 degrees in either direction, piling up dangerous waves that have swamped many a boat with disastrous consequences.

I realize fullwell that this is a rather grim reminder of past events, but remember - - - we want to see you picking up a big fishing trophy come the end of the year.

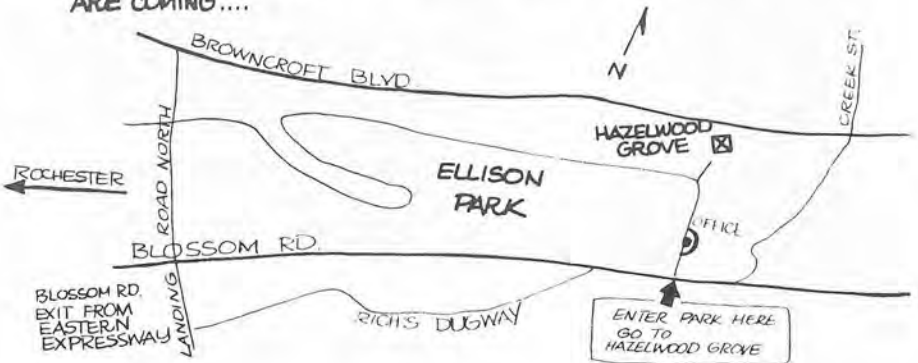

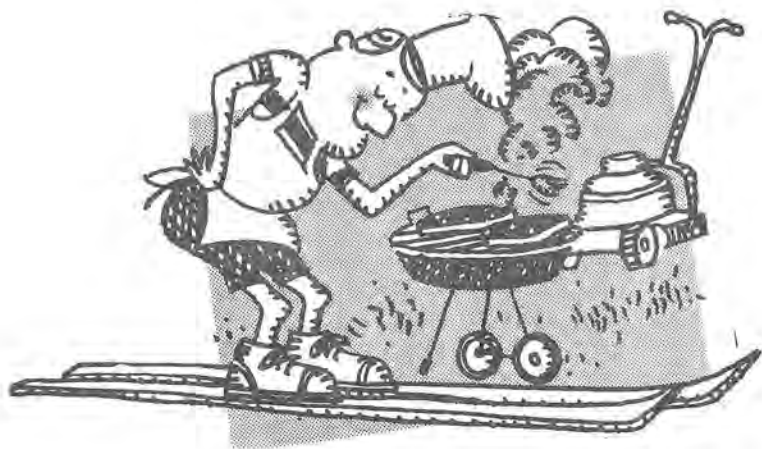
KEUKA LAKE SPLASH PARTY - 7/23/72 - Picnic and water fun at one of the beautiful Finger Lakes.

### CAMPING HINTS

#### Dishwashing

Dishwashing in camp can be easily and safely handled by using disposable paper goods and by washing cutlery and utensils in boiling water and allowing them to air dry. But do a good job because illness from bacteria can ruin your trip. Paper towels are excellent for wiping out pots and pans before washing them. Paper goods should be burned, placed in a litter can or carried away.



#### Garbage

The safest way to dispose of garbage, cans and bottles is to place them in a trash can at the campground or carry them out of the woods with you to a community facility, a gas station or roadside barrel. Don't try to bury them or throw them in the water; bottles break and aluminum cans do not deteriorate rapidly. Buried garbage attracts unwanted animals.

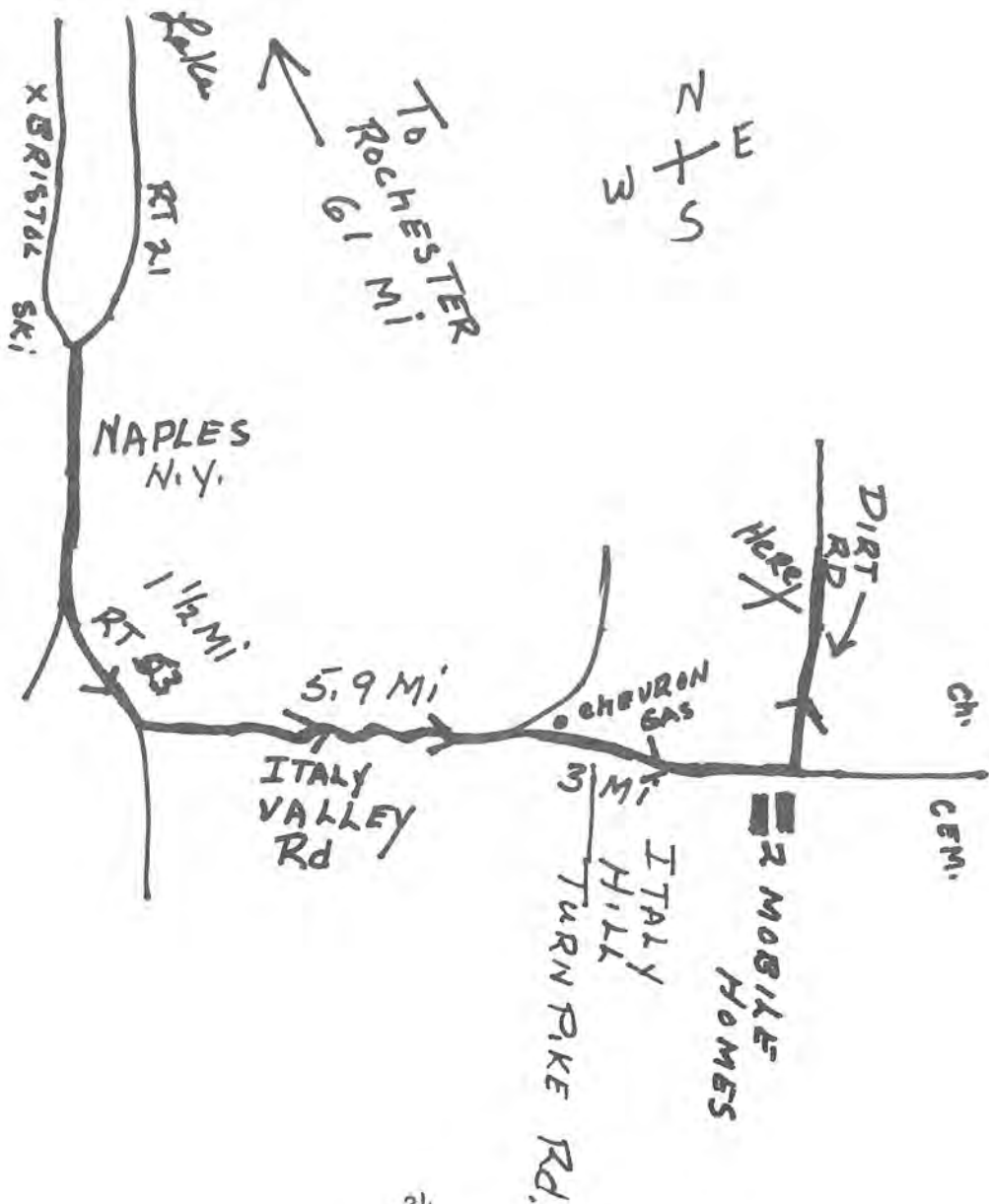

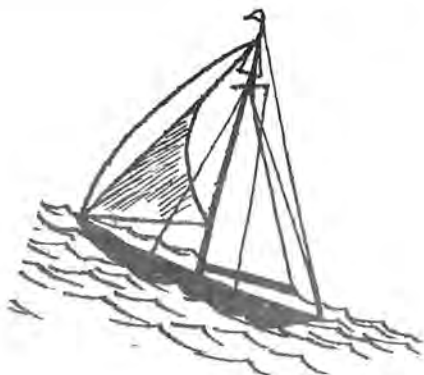
And, one last thanks to you, our audiences, over 3,000
