As the thundering waters created by Hurricane Agnes gradually subsided, most of those who ventured into the Southern Tier area this summer were astounded by the tremendous devastation visited upon the homes, businesses, highways and farmlands throughout these picturesque valleys.

The floods ruined not only the dwellings of thousands of people but also the habitat of small game and fish. The wildlife will probably recover quickly but some of the important trout streams, especially around the Finger Lakes, have been so badly ripped apart that it will take years before they fully regain their former usefulness as rainbow nurseries.

Not only did those raging torrents tear down trees and structures along the streams but they also damaged cribbing, "V" deflectors, and digger dams built by the Dept. of Environmental Conservation to provide spawning areas for those big rainbows up from the Finger Lakes each spring.

Presently, bulldozers are reshaping the main stretches of Naples Creek into a wide-open ditch. Uprooted trees, branches and brush have been cleared out and shoved into huge piles ready for burning. This is a sad picture indeed compared to its former beauty as a quietly meandering stream between shaded tree-lined pools.

After the storm abated and the high waters retreated to where boating was again permitted, anglers quickly discovered that most of the fish in area lakes were biting mad. Perch, bass, pike and trout have continued to hit at a lively pace all summer - so take advantage of this opportunity while it lasts.

Our FALL SHOW Friday night, October 27, is aimed at pleasing the hunter. It will feature not only two new films, "Wild Turkeys" and "White Tail Deer", but also Fred Slater, Wildlife Manager, Region 8 (Western N.Y. & Southern Tier),



who will describe the up-to-date condition of the area deer herds (which incidentally look excellent) as well as the latest news about turkeys, partridge, rabbits and pheasants. A question and answer period will follow.

National attention is being focused this month on the good being done by the hunters and fishermen toward preserving wildlife and their habitat.

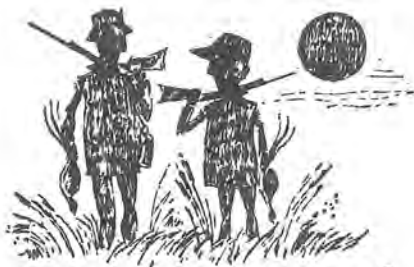
President Nixon and the U.S. Congress have proclaimed National Hunting and Fishing Day, September 23, in order to properly inform the American people about the good works of dedicated sportsmen.

All too often, powerful and extremely unfair criticism has been leveled at the hunter in the press and on TV. Now, hunters are placed in a position where they are often required to defend their sport before those people who do not hunt, and make the facts clear as to the proper use of our country's wildlife-and still be considered conservationists.

A 3-inch sticker marking National Hunting and Fishing Day has been enclosed so that you may also join the millions of sportsmen proclaiming this great date.

In view of the president's proclamation, the Rochester Rifle Club is sponsoring a special fund-raising dinner to be held at Logan's on October 2, to which all sportsmen and their wives are invited. Warren Page of Field & Stream magazine will be the featured speaker and other nationally prominent sportsmen are expected to attend.

Proceeds from this enjoyable evening will go toward the construction of a new indoor shooting range which will be equipped to provide Hunter Safety Training and marksmanship practice for the community's young hunters as well as adults.

YOUNG WATERFOWLER'S TRAINING PROGRAM
ANNOUNCED AT
MONTEZUMA NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE

Montezuma National Wildlife Refuge and cooperating sportsmen's clubs will again offer the highly successful Young Waterfowler's Training Program this fall. The program is open to any youngster, boy or girl, from 14 to 18 years of age, who has not previously hunted waterfowl.

Each youngster must complete a training program that includes waterfowl identification, State and Federal game regulations, gun safety, decoys and calling, retrieving dogs, and sportsmanship. This latter characteristic is probably the most important aspect of the entire program. The training is provided by sportsmen's clubs -- locally, it's the Lake Plains Waterfowl Association. The club also provides an instructor, an adult over 21, who accompanies the youth on the actual hunt held on the refuge in the event the youngster's parent is unable to participate.

Further training is provided at a Field Day held just prior to the waterfowl season on the refuge. This year, the second, third, and fourth Saturdays of the waterfowl season have again been reserved for the youngsters.

Anyone interested in the program in this area may contact Andy Sperr at 225-0373. He is Program Chairman for the Lake Plains Waterfowl Association, which has participated in the program since it began in 1966. Also active in the program are Wes Beadling of Film Technical Services, Ed Fiorino of Synthetic Chemicals Division, and Dick Newcomb of the Research Division.





With the Annual KPAA Rod and Gun Club Pheasant Shoot scheduled for October 7 and 8, many of us will be turning our thoughts toward the coming hunting season.

It's the time of year for checking out the 'ole scatter gun, rifle and other gear that is essential for an enjoyable and successful season. Many an hour will be spent getting our gear in perfect shape.

One necessary piece of equipment, however, is neglected by many of us. It is allowed to lie around all summer, get soft and fat, and very often gets to the point of not performing the way it was intended to.

If you haven't guessed by now, I am talking about your gun dog. This is the time of year that a definite effort should be made to get him out several times a week for a good run and a chance to move some game. If you can't get him out, some form of yard exercise should be used every day. This could be no more than 15 minutes of chasing a thrown ball.

This conditioning is of prime importance in the early part of the season where the weather is apt to be warm and cause your dog to play out faster.

For those of you who give your animal an extensive training period, be sure to watch his diet. If you have his weight and general condition where you want it and are maintaining a strong exercise program, you may have to increase his food in much the same way as is required when he is hunted extensively.

So, give your animal a break and see to it that he is in shape for the season. You will enjoy it more and, what is more important, so will he.

P.S. If you don't have a dog, please try to hunt with some one who does. Even the most mediocre dog can chase and catch a wounded bird that otherwise might be lost. The use of a dog (preferably trained) is one of the best ways of preserving game.

The fall season of duplicate bridge begins with lessons and play on Sept. 11. John and Bonnie Swenholt again will give the lessons in beginning and intermediate bridge. These lessons are excellent. If you want to begin bridge or improve your bridge game, sign up for this course. The first will be given at 7 P.M. on Sept. 11.

The regular games plus supervised play for those attending the lessons begins at 8 P.M. On a typical Monday night, about 27 tables are in play in the regular game plus another nine tables in the novice game. This is by far the largest duplicate bridge game in the Rochester area. The friendly atmosphere helps the players to enjoy themselves, while the good competition challenges their bridge skill.

Mr. and Mrs. MacKay follow (Ginny, 61.19%, Jim 61.13%), followed by the Phil Kleins (60.08% each) and the John Clarkes (60.02% each).

Two club championship events were held during the summer, both charity games. The ACBL Charity game, held for the benefit of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, was won by Mr. and Mrs. Ross Militello (63.3%), followed by Zolovick and Toombs tied with Hillman and Reiner (62.3%), Mrs. Matye - Mrs. Humphrey (60.7%) Rossi - Milano (59.9%) and Mrs. Plant - Mrs. Kascher (59.5%).

The second charity tournament was held for the benefit of the Al Sigl Center. Skip Toombs and George Zolovick won (64.6%) followed by Dave Chen and John Donovan (63.5%), Al DeYaeger - Henry Kascher (58.9%), Mr. and Mrs. Bill Scahill (58.7%) and Bill Fisher - Bob Meisel tied with Mary Alice Pegnam - Audrey Matye (58.0%).

The 1972-72 Industrial Team-of-Four League ended on a bright note for Kodak. The League Championship was won by the Kodak team of Dave Chen, John Donovan, Lee Kennedy and Bill Prensky. In the championship match in June, this team defeated a Xerox team by 93 International Match Points (IMPS) in a 26-board match. This was the first time a Kodak team won the league championship. 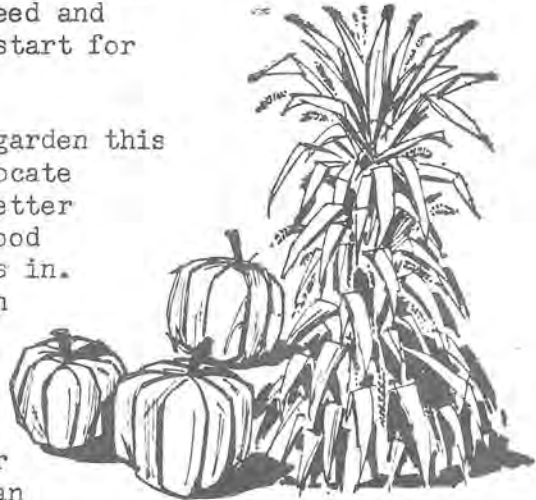
ROSE and GARDEN CLUB



When did we have it? Where did it go? It usually lasts June 21 to Sept. 21.

Do you have weeds in your lawn? This is the last chance this year to kill them with weed killer. It is also a good time to reseed and fertilize lawn to get a good start for next spring.

Were you satisfied with your garden this year? Now is the time to relocate perennials and shrubs for a better showing. They should get a good start before cold weather sets in. If they are carefully dug with plenty of soil around the roots, they should survive. Water well.



Check your flowering bulbs for planting later this fall. Plan your material for protecting your tender plants and rose bushes. Roses should be mounded up at least between six and eight inches above the budded stock after the first good freeze.

Now is a good time to make cuttings from geraniums for over-winter storage.

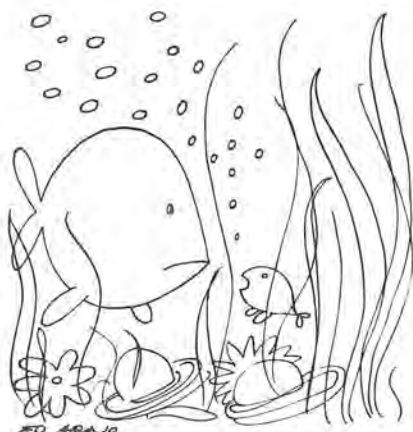

Also getting a good deal of publicity these days, and rightfully so, is the growing problem of unscrupulously buffed or "whizzed" coins. These are usually VF or XF coins (Lincoln cents are a favorite) which are chemically or mechanically polished to look like and sell as BU. Watch out for them and learn to tell the difference.

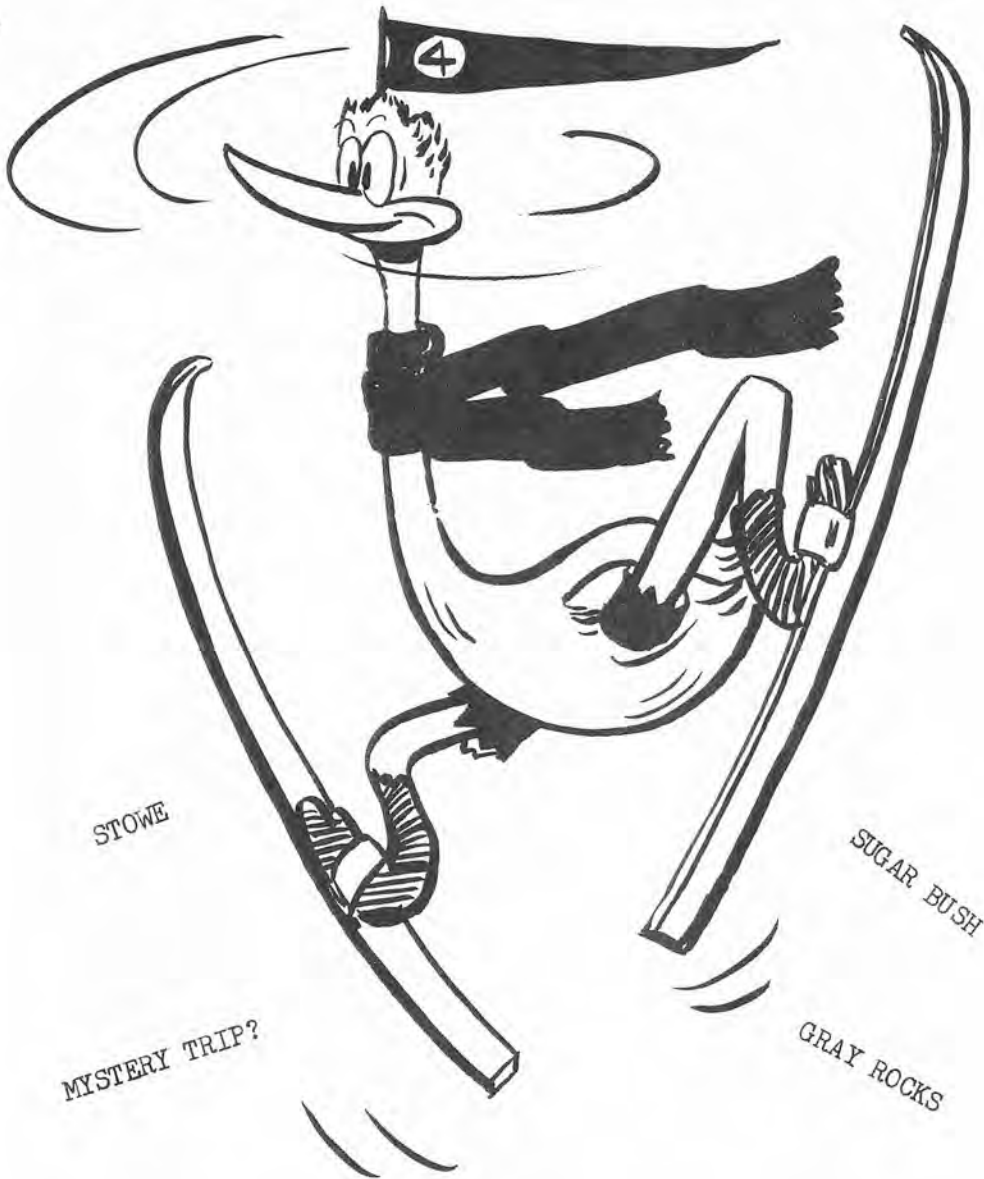
