With all this activity, we shouldn't have trouble finding some real good racing providing the weather man co-operates.

Many of you are aware that Maynard Troyer, Spencerport, N.Y., was the 1970 New York State Modified Champion but are you aware of the people who worked real hard to come up with a State Champion?

A group of dedicated race fans, including several Kodak people, formed a committee known as the New York State Awards Committee. Their function was to contact all 29 tracks in New York State running Modified Stocks and to set up uniform rules and a uniform point system based on the number of laps of the feature race.

The group received weekly race results from all tracks and accumulated driver points. In order to obtain any points at all, a driver had to finish in the top ten of the feature race.

Last year over 450 drivers had accumulated points toward the championship.

In order to raise funds for the Championship, the committee has a 11" x 14" jig saw puzzle for sale of the 1970 Langhorne parade lap in color. Puzzles are available from Marilyn Nolte, call 75514, or Lynne Berg, phone 83617, for only \$1.00 or they can be purchased at most tracks.

This will be the last year for the one-mile

Langhorne, Pa., track. It will be torn up to make way for a shopping plaza.

The big open Modified Sportsman race at Langhorne is scheduled for October 9 & 10. Tickets have been ordered and will be available from Marilyn Toal and at the KPAA Office later this month.

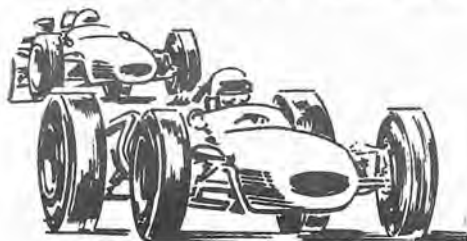

TAKE A BOY FISHING

Time and again it has been demonstrated that boys who have cultivated an interest in such outdoor activities as camping, hiking, or fishing are much less apt to become entangled with the law than are boys who have not had the opportunity to learn the fascinations of the great out-of-doors.

Introducing a youngster to the wonders of a fish pond can be a most satisfying experience. Father-and-son fishing expeditions offer an opportunity to do something together without the tension and competition of such father-son activities as Little League baseball.

Fishing has no age limits and even the youngest may participate. However, when a youngster is along, the fishing should be geared to his level; he shouldn't accompany you on your trip -- YOU SHOULD ACCOMPANY HIM ON HIS TRIP. Bouncing lead for lakers may be your idea of the ultimate in recreation, but for a youngster it could be extremely dull.

A youngster's attention span is short. There should be some sort of activity going on most of the time. This means lots of small fish rather than pitting your wits against the evasive tacklebuster that has so far avoided you. It may sound dull, but to anyone who has seen the thrill on a young face as the lad battles a sunfish or bullhead, the satisfaction is greater than landing a lunker. You will soon find yourself putting your rod aside and carefully maneuvering the boat to points where your fisherman can fish choice spots.

Modern day spinning equipment can make panfish a very lively sport. While casting for perch and sunfish, a youngster will learn the principles of handling his tackle safely while actually catching fish.

It is amazing how uncooperative even panfish can be when you are really counting on them. This is the ideal time to show the boy that there is a lot more to fishing than catching fish. By opening his eyes to the



many activities of the other inhabitants around the pond, you can show him how to bring home memories that will make it possible to come home empty-handed but refreshed.

The warm water ponds, where panfishing is the best, are full of all types of interesting life that can open a youngster's eyes to the many varied wonders of nature. A small school of minnows drifting unconcernedly may not look dramatic, but in the shadow of a floating leaf a few feet away lies a motionless little two-inch pickerel. As the minnow drifts by the leaf there is a flash and the predator is on its prey. A little shifting of the minnow and it is started headfirst down the pickerel's throat. The commotion lasts only a moment. The minnows again drift quietly near the pickerel which is resting calmly with the minnow's tail still protruding from its mouth.

Little incidents like this are going on around you all the time as you fish. Teach the boy how to see them, and these little dramas will often become much more vivid memories than even the memories of a good day's catch.

Children are insatiably curious, as any parent who has lived with the unending "why" knows. While fishing is slack, point out the minute plant and animal forms that can be just barely seen in the water. Explain how these are important food for the minnow which just served as food for the pickerel. You can point out that the pond is just like the farmer's pasture and will produce only so many pounds of fish. If too many fish survived, there would not be enough food to go around. Instead of starving, the little fish just wouldn't grow into big fish.

Now that you have carefully explained why it is good conservation to keep all the little panfish rather than throw them back to compete for food, your youngster will land an under-sized nine inch bass. WHY must you throw this bigger fish back???? Your answer to that one is tough to be sure but that's part of the challenge.

For a wonderful experience and a great change of pace - take a young boy fishing.

WHERE TO TAKE THE BOY FISHING

With the help of several expert anglers including Gene Killip of Bldg. 6 and Eddie Morf of Max's Tackle & Bait Store, we selected a number of fishing spots suitable for a boy's fishing trip. Prior to that big event, the rough spots on both of your rod-handling techniques can be remedied by casting a soft rubber plug at a tin can or pail placed in the back yard out of range of trees, wires, or windows. This can be followed up with digging for worms in the garden or looking for nightcrawlers after dark with an old flashlight.

Since this is 'his fishing trip' play it by ear --- guide, suggest, encourage, but do not boss or use force. However never skip on safety and always have him wear a life-jacket when in the boat the same as many expert anglers we know.

Stream and bank fishing is great fun but from experience we have found that many boys often prefer the noise and action of an outboard.

For boat fishing with a boy:

1. The south end of Honeoye Lake offers a picturesque setting and the area is loaded with panfish. A State Boat Launching Site is located off the East Lake Road near the south end of the lake or you can put your boat in at the California Ranch on the West Lake Road.
2. Sodus Bay provides good panfishing near the channel to the lake. Boats may be rented at Chase's Boat Livery at Sodus Point as well as some other spots on the bay.
3. The weed beds at the south end of Canandaigua Lake and the West River channel both produce a wide variety of panfish, bass, and pickerel. Clark's Boat Livery is conveniently located on the west side of the lake along Routes 21 & 64. Boats, motors, and bait are available during the summer.
4. A small boat livery has been in service for many years near the south end of Conesus Lake off the West Lake Road. This part of the lake has a good population of perch and panfish. If you don't have action in 10-to-20 feet of water, drag an anchor along the bottom for 40-to-50 feet and then position your boat over the area where you have stirred up the mud.
5. Oak Orchard Creek some 30 miles west of

Rochester also produces good bass and panfishing. A boat livery is located at Point Breeze close to good fishing. This creek is relatively unaffected by winds and is an interesting spot even on a bad day.

For bank fishing with a boy:

1. A good choice we think would be the east pier at Fairhaven Bay located some 65 miles east of Rochester. Picnic tables and other park facilities are located near the good fishing area.

2. Closer to Rochester, there is Long Pond's shoreline near the lake, Sandy Creek off Lake Ontario Parkway north of Brockport, the east jetty at Braddock's Bay (fish bay side), and the northeast end of Irondequoit Bay.

3. The 'Wide-Waters' on the Barge Canal one mile west of Spencerport are a little more difficult to work but there are plenty of panfish there.

4. The Barge Canal locks at Lyons are best left to the more experienced angler. This latter spot is found by driving east on Route 31 to Lyons and turning left at the dirt road just before crossing the canal bridge. Good fishing is reported along the breakwall all the way to Canandaigua Outlet falls.

Dress the boy comfortably but have a light rain jacket handy in case the weather changes.

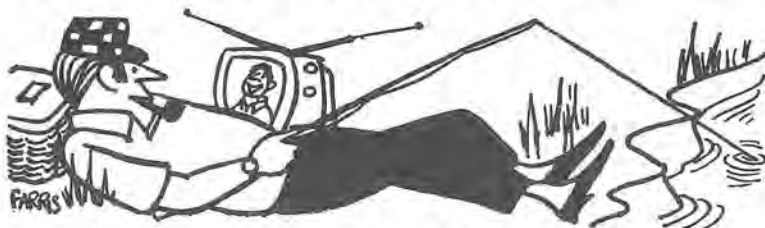
Plan to cook some hotdogs over a small wood or charcoal fire on long sharpened saplings. These will never taste better than when washed down with lots of coke or ginger ale. However keep it all very simple.

Take your camera as everyone will enjoy seeing pictures of this adventure especially in the years to come.

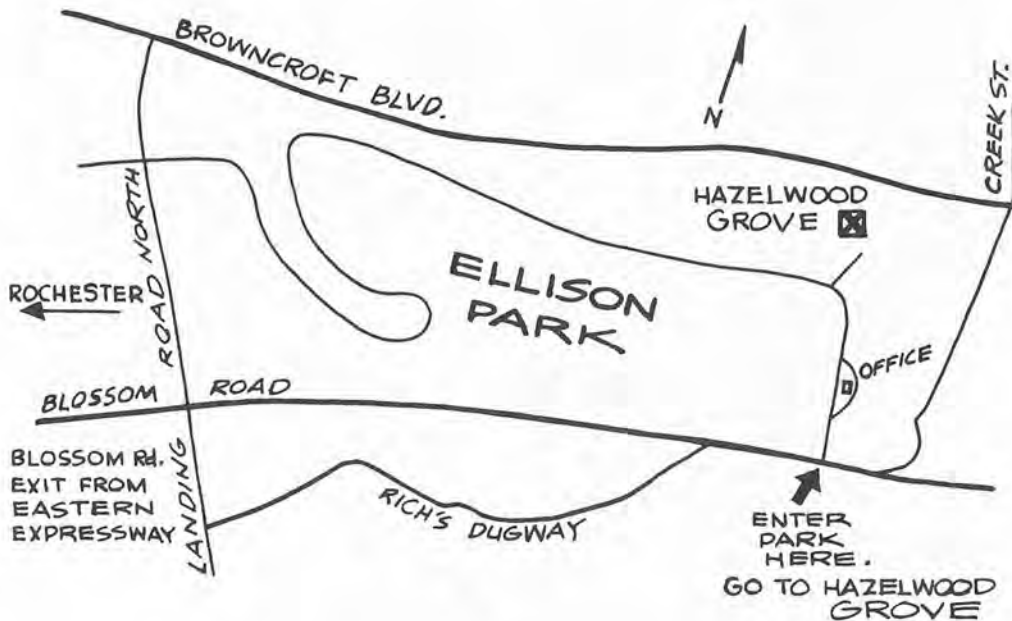

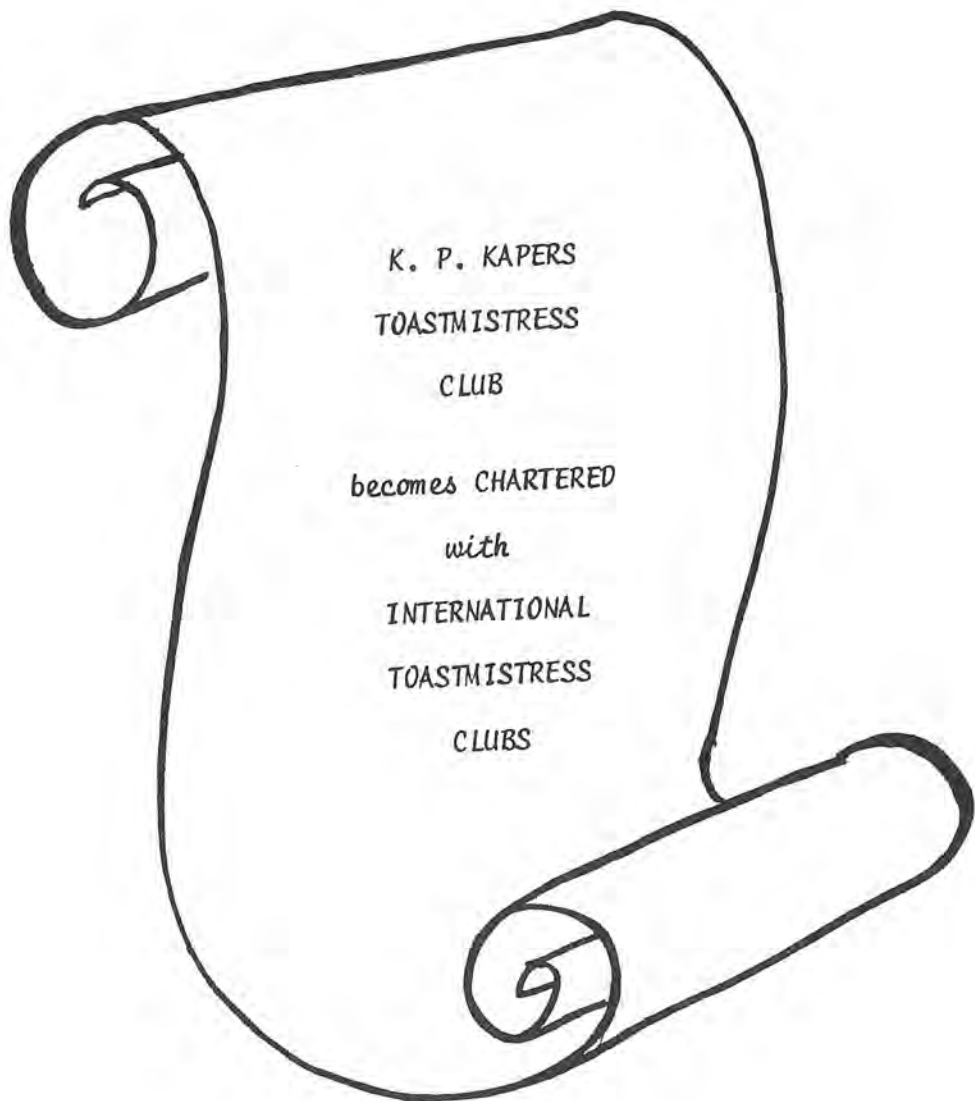

The 1970-71 season concludes with a dinner meeting June 10, at 5:30 p.m. in the service dining room, Bldg. 28. The program has been planned so that wives and friends will find this meeting interesting. A movie, "The Ultimate Achievement", will be shown. It describes the design, engraving, metal working, and minting steps that lead to the production of a coin or medal. A short but lively auction will follow.

The nominating committee has selected a list of candidates for club officers for 1971-72. This list is headed by Bill Coe who has been nominated for presiding chairman. Bill served as program chairman during the past year. The elections will be held at the June dinner meeting.

The April meeting featured a fine talk by Doug Borden on the Mill coinage with presses, and the resistance this change brought from the metal workers who had previously made all coins by hand. Doug showed slides to illustrate this transition period in coin making and commented on the marked improvement resulting from the slow but sure introduction of machinery into coin minting.

The first 1971 half dollars are beginning to appear in circulation. It is hoped that this clad coin will reestablish the fifty-cent coin in general use. Collectors might also prepare to order Eisenhower dollars. Forms needed to order the proof coins (\$10) and the un-circulated coins (\$3) each will be available at post offices and banks soon. For more patient collectors, the \$1 coins will be available later in the year through local banks.

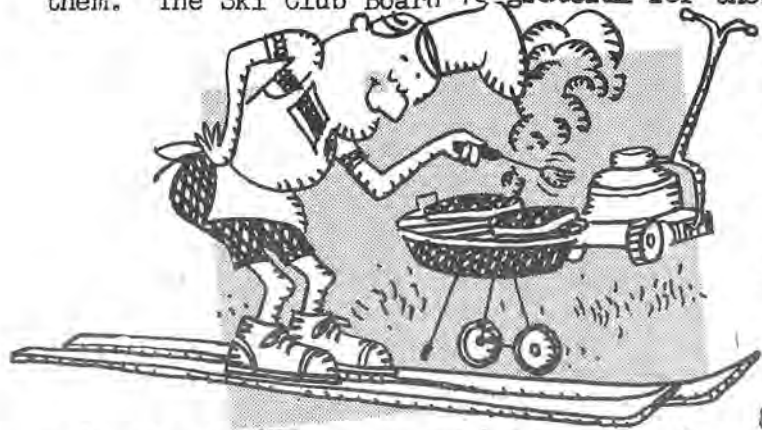

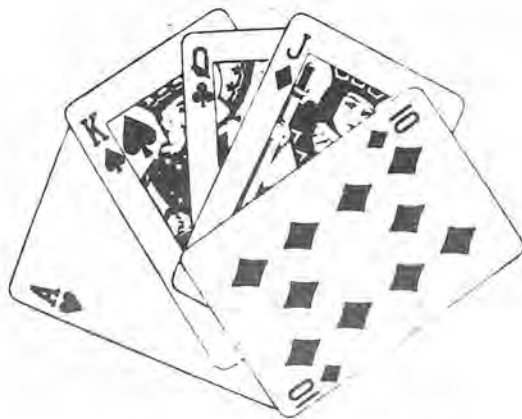
