September 26 - Oswego Speedway, Modified

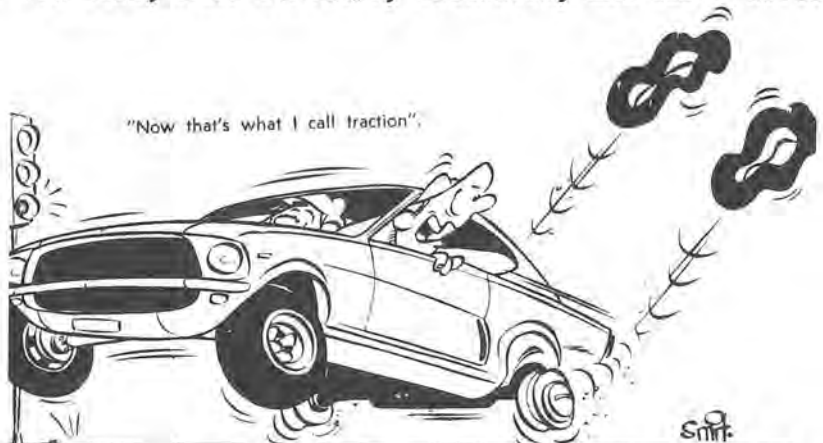
October 9 & 10 - Langhorne, Pa., Modified Open



ROD 'n' GUN



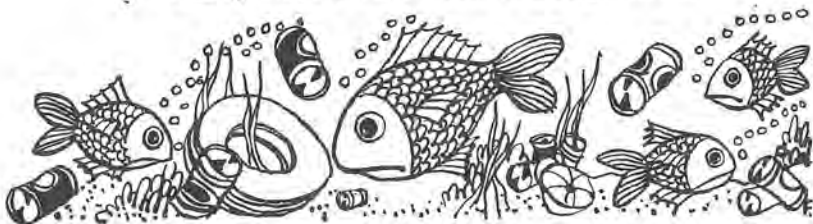
Heading the list of vacation thrills for September are several excellent choices for the sportsman endowed with wanderlust. Included would be salmon fishing in Michigan, surf casting and deep-sea fishing for big stripers and blues from Cape Cod, Mass. to Long Island Sound, N.Y., trolling for muskies in such turbulent waters as the Upper Niagara River, and if you really want to do it big, it's hunting Canadian Geese around the swampy shores of James Bay with Indian guides.

According to all reports, the most popular choice will be chinook and coho salmon fishing in the famous Muskegon and Manistee Rivers which flow into Lake Michigan from the west side of the Lower Peninsula.

Taking such a vacation will be one of Kodak's most attractive and best known lady anglers - Candy Wendall of Building 30 Melting Office and her husband, Dick. They will be joining up again with their friends, Shirley and Joe Riefer (originator of the Mystic Mask fishing lure), at a campsite along the Muskegon River not far from the town of Newaygo.

As soon as word arrives that these big 30 - 40 pound chinooks are all set to leave the safety of the lake for an awe-inspiring dash to the upper headwaters, the Wendalls and Riefers will be off with their tires spinning. During the final week in September last year, they not only ended up with plenty of fish, but also with the mangiest array of tangled tackle, broken rods, miles of lost line, and more burned-out reels than any angler could ever imagine.

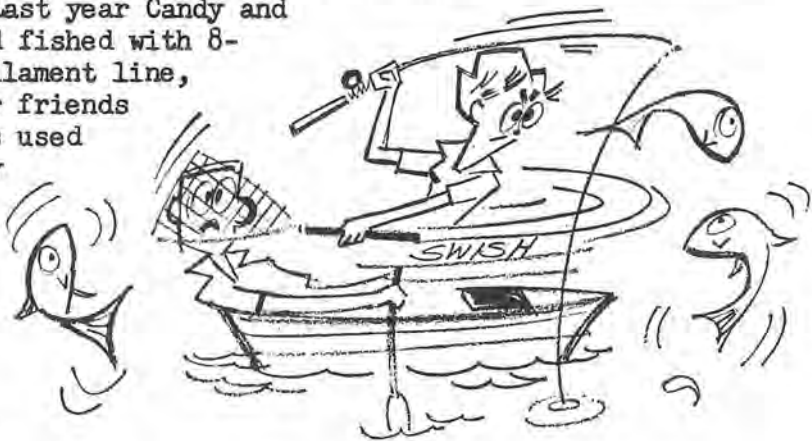
"Whew, sure has been a rough summer"



The usual approach to this type of fishing is not quite as idealistic as Lee Wulff demonstrates on TV with a colorful salmon streamer, 4 lb. test leader, and an ultra-light fly rod. Rather, it's fast water full of logs, rocks and floating snags that demand some extra rugged gear. In addition, these chinooks are powerful fish with a mean disposition bent on making that upriver journey without any fooling around with such things as tasty tidbits, colorful flies and assorted lures.

After the salmon reach their final destination and spawning is completed, they up and die right there in the stream sometimes by the thousand. Michigan conservation officials, not wanting a mess of dead fish floating down the river, are interested in having as many people as possible catch them while they are still edible - so almost any technique of hooking them has been legal. However the rules are subject to change from year-to-year so you must study the latest instructions that come with your fishing permit to be on the safe side of the law.

Last year Candy and her husband fished with 8-foot monofilament line, while their friends the Riefers used Fenwick fly rods set up with Mitchell reels. In addition to a large assortment of fishing



and camping gear, these couples brought along two 14-foot rowboats powered with small outboards so they could easily reach the more productive sections of the river without the problems of shoulder-to-shoulder bank-type fishing.

Long before daybreak, they would put forth on the river, inching their way carefully through the darkness to "the hot spot" where they would anchor their boat. Then they would quickly rig up their rods with their best lures - big, doubly sharp treble hooks set securely in a lump of lead. This weighted hook was then cast into the deeper parts of the pool, hopefully over a snag-free gravel bottom, and jerked erratically toward the boat.

With this fishing technique, the big salmon fanning the current near the bottom would be caught some-

times in the belly and then again by the tail. At the touch of the barb, Ye Olde Salmon would soar out of the water in a mighty leap that would send a shower of spray from bank-to-bank before tearing out a hundred or more yards of line in a reel-squawking run. It was spectacular fishing and every morning these die-hard anglers had to arise earlier and earlier in order to get to their favorite fishing spot before the natives beat them to it.

On the last day of their vacation, Candy's husband hooked a real monster. It leaped, tore out line, ran under the boat, and all the time her husband was yelling instructions to her to net the fish, "NET THE FISH, --- NET THE FISH!!" As it came rushing toward the boat he yelled, "GET 'EM, GET 'EM!!"

Candy made a mighty lunge with the long-handled net just as the fish suddenly dove under the boat. Over went the whole works - boat, people, fishing gear, cameras, and lunch. Candy came up sputtering from a 'big' lung full of water and the current swept her out over the deepest part of the stream.

In one way or another, her husband managed to keep her from drowning. As they reached the safety of shallow water, she realized for the first time that he was still playing the big salmon on a half-busted rod. Although most of their gear was lost, he hardly paused long enough to see her safely in dry clothes before hurring off to the nearest tackle shop to weigh that 38-pound trophy.

With sparkling eyes and a big smile, you just know that Candy Wendall is looking forward to this year's vacation - and catching a bigger salmon than her husband now seems very important.


We all wish you lots of success, Candy, and if possible, bring us back a good picture for Kodakery without a bottom-up viewpoint.

K.P.A.A. PISTOL CLUB

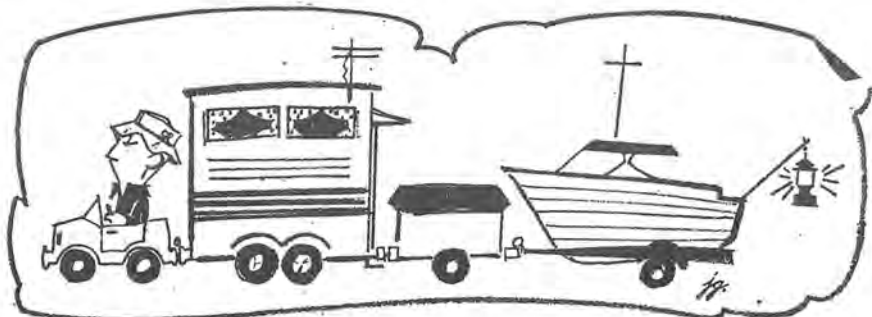

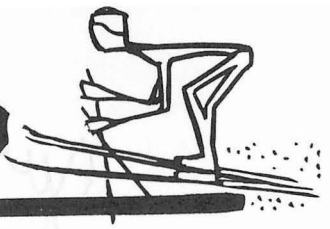

Here we go again!

Summer is fast coming to an end and plans for another ski season are shaping up. Speaking of shaping up, it is never too early to start exercising those summer-softened muscles so that you'll be ready for the slopes when the snow flies.

Our first event for the 1971-72 season will be our third annual car rally and picnic on September 12.

What is a rally?

A rally is a form of automotive test in which cars leave a starting point individually, at carefully recorded times, and are directed to follow a "more-or-less" complicated route to a finish. A rally is NOT a race. It is a test of driving skill and the ability to follow directions. To make sure that the rallyists are staying on the rally route and on time, there are check points located at unlikely spots along the way. Points will be lost for missing a checkpoint (getting lost), being late at a checkpoint (going too slow), or being early at a checkpoint (going too fast). Those people with the least number of points against them at the end of the rally are the winners.

What do you need to rally?

1. A car, any car, as long as it is in safe operating condition.
2. A pencil, paper, and a watch. Expensive equipment is not necessary.
3. Someone you can get along with. A rally is a team effort--driver and navigator.

This year's rally will start from the Webster Plaza on route 104. Technical inspection will be at 10:30 a.m., first car off at 11.01. All entrants must be registered at the KPAA Office, Bldg. 28, on or before September 10. There will be no registering at the rally. The price is only 50¢ per car and trophies will be awarded to both the driver and navigator of the cars placing first, second and third. This is a fun-type, beginners rally. Cars with

professional rally equipment will not be allowed to compete for an award. So if you're a complete novice, come out anyway, you have an excellent chance to win a beautiful trophy.

Following the rally, a picnic will be held at Webster Park - Lakeview Shelter #1, off Lake Road in Webster. The price is \$1.00/person, and tickets can be purchased on or before September 10 at the KPAA Office, Bldg. 28. Hots and hamburgers, salads and beverages will be served. Also, the winners of the rally will be announced and the trophies will be awarded at the picnic.

Why not make a day of it and attend the rally and picnic? If you can't attend both, feel free to join us for either the rally or the picnic. I'm sure you'll have fun and both are excellent ways to get to know fellow skiers.
