The auction following the regular meeting will feature Indian cents this month. Hope to see you all there.

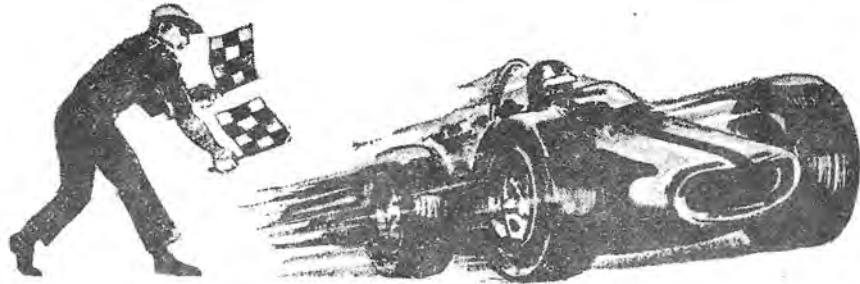

With the feature race at Langhorne, Pa, rained out, there isn't much to write about. The race is re-scheduled for Sunday, October 17. I am not sure I will make the second try, shortage of \$\$\$\$. The Saturday time trials started out with a track record. Roger Treichler of Sanborn, N.Y., was the first man on the track and broke Maynard Troyer's 1970 record of 114 MPH. A short time after, Geoff Bodin shattered Roger's record. The first four in time trials are Bodin, Treichler, Dutch Hoag and Richie Evans.



The two 20-mile heat races for qualifying were excellent. Bob Hudson and Sonny Seamon crossed the line about even. Hudson had a possible 2-foot lead but track officials ruled it a tie and both cars are in the feature race. The second 20-miler was won by Bob Merz in his own #33. On Bob's bumper for second place was Neil Truesdell. Lee Osborne qualified the Turner Bros. #18. About 170 cars were in the pits trying for the 42 spots on race day.

Saturday night I went to Reading, Pa., for the Jackie Evans Memorial Race. Although the feature race was rained out, the four heat races and two consi races were well worth the admission price. I have never seen such excellent dirt track racing. The leaders were taking the track in 22 seconds for a 1/2-mile track. The grandstand featured all chair seats, the lighting and safety were superb. Next year plan to attend Reading for the Jackie Evans Memorial Race for the best in racing.

Lee wulff, famous fisherman, hunter, outdoor lecturer, and television personality on the "American Sportsman", will present a truly memorable program Friday night, November 5, in the E. K. From all reports, the deer population in the Southern Tier region appears to be in top condition, with some of the best hunting concentrated along the brushy hillsides around the southern portions of the Finger Lakes as well as similar regions to the south and west.



Sad but true, the increasing number of posted lands showing up in all areas is working a great hardship on most sportsmen. So, it is important that everyone exercise great care and courtesy when out in the field to safeguard the lands which are still open, and protect the landowners' rights and property wherever they may be. New York State has several game management areas set aside for use by the hunter, such as High Tor east of Naples and Rattlesnake Hill near Canaseraga. Such spots will provide good hunting most of the season even if you aren't lucky enough to know farmers who will allow you on their property.

Always practice safety when you handle firearms and always wear a bright orange jacket and hat when you plan to hunt in fields and woods. One of our Rod & Gun Club's past directors was shot through the leg by a stray deer slug a couple of years ago and his trip to the hospital was anything but pleasant.

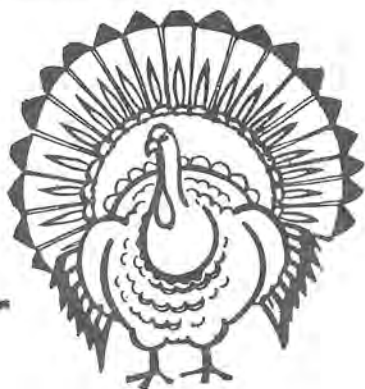
Dress for the waterfowler hidden in a marshy blind is a

different story, however. Here the best-camouflaged outfit is a must if the hunter is to avoid detection by the sharp eyes of high-flying geese or shot-happy duck. Fortunately for duck hunters, the worse the weather the better the gunning and as everyone knows, most of our November days aren't apt to humor a bluebird.



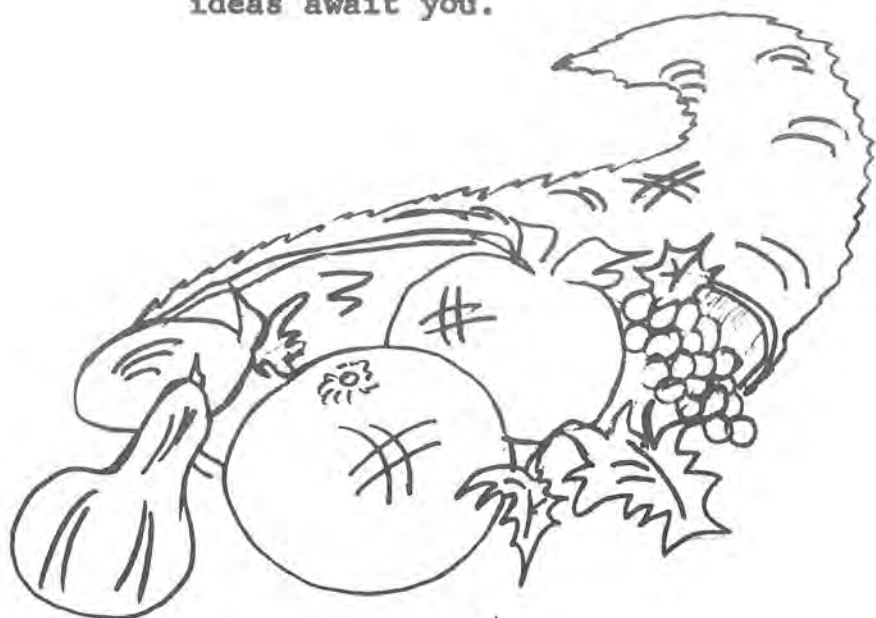

Remember, skating is a healthy sport. Try it and enjoy it.

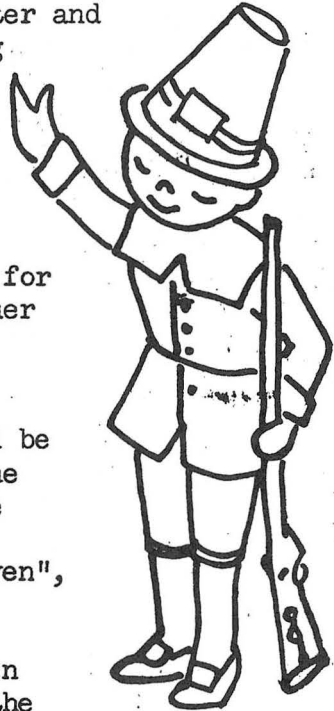

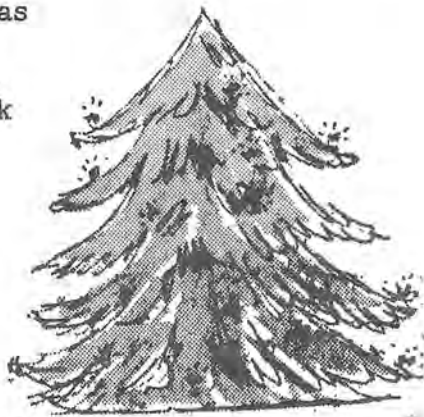

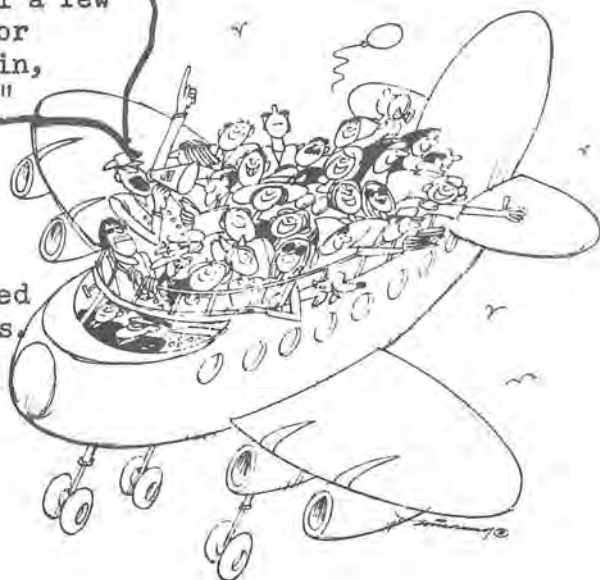

The KPAA is again sponsoring this year the New York State Young Snowmobile Operators' Safety Training Course. The Course is open to employees children between the ages of 10 and 16.

It will consist of three 3-hour classes and will be held November 12, November 19 and December 3 from 7 - 10 P.M. in Bldg. 328.

Successful completion of this course grants the youngster a N.Y.S. Snowmobile Safety Certificate which entitles him to operate a snowmobile alone on lands open for snowmobiling and now owned by his parent.

The course includes explanations of basic safety rules, N. Y. S. snowmobile law and general snowmobile operation. Visual aids, such as charts, films and actual snowmobiles are used extensively.
