



Helping Housewives Save Money by Cutting Food Budgets

Thrifty housewives who are faced with the problem of preparing appetizing and nutritious meals at low cost will find the following menus and recipes, created and tested by the R.G. & E. Home Service Department, helpful in their battle against the rising cost of foodstuffs:

MENU NO. 1

German Meat Dumpling Soup
Whole Wheat Rolls Green Salad
Baked Apple Cookies

MEAT DUMPLINGS 1/2 lb. ground beef 1/2 lb. ground pork or liver

Pear Salad

1 egg 1 c. fine bread crumbs 1/4 t. sage

1 t. salt 4 t. pepper

Mix all of the ingredients in the order given. Form into balls the size of an egg and cook in boiling soup for 1 hour.

MENU NO. 2

Seven-Layer Dinner

RECIPES

SPICED BEEF STEW

2 slices bacon or 4 T. bacon drippings 2 lbs. lean beef 2 qts. hot water ½ t. salt 2 T. whole mixed spices

8 onions 4 carrets

8 small potatoes

Cook bacon until crisp, or melt drippings. Add meat to the fat and cook until brown. Add water, salt, and spices tied in a bag. Cook 15 minutes and remove spices. Cook 1 hour, then add vegetables and continue cooking until vegetables are tender. Remove meat and vegetables to a platter and thicken gravy with a little flour moistened with cold water. Pour over the meat.

SEVEN LAYER DINNER—Temp: 350° F. Time: 2 hours

Butter a large casserole dish and arrange a 1 inch layer of potatoes in bottom. Cover the potatoes with a layer of sliced onions and the onions with a layer of sliced carrots. Wash ¼ c. rice and sprinkle over the carrots and sprinkle generously with salt and pepper. Pour 1 No. 2 can of peas over the rice and cover with 1½ lbs. sausage meat. Pour over this 1 can condensed Tomato Soup and bake covered in a preheated oven.

GERMAN MEAT DUMPLING SOUP

1 soup bone
1 c. chopped celery
1 c. chopped carrot
4 c. chopped onion
1 c. tomatoes
1 T. uncooked rice
4 t. salt
4 ats. water

Put all of the ingredients into a large kettle, bring to the boiling point and simmer 2½ hours. Remove soup bone. Add Meat Dumplings to soup, cover, and cook 1 hour.

Furnace Coils Do Not Save Money Nor Give Real Hot Water Service

Many families still use furnace coils for heating water under the false impression that waste heat from the furnace is utilized to furnish free hot water. Nothing could be farther from the truth. When the furnace is asked to play a dual role and heat water as well as the house, considerably more fuel must be used. Tests made at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology prove that approximately twenty per cent more fuel will be used, and that a gas automatic water heater will heat an equivalent amount of hot water for approximately the same cost.

With the furnace coil method of water heating, the supply of hot water is dependent on the weather rather than the health, comfort and needs of the family. When the furnace is going full blast on a wintry day hot water is available, but on milder days, when the fire is checked, water is barely warm. Family health demands an adequate supply of water sufficiently hot to destroy germ life. A gas automatic water heater, set for 145 degrees temperature, will kill even the deadly streptococcus germ.

There is no economy in a furnace coil. With an automatic gas water heater you can heat the same amount of water just as cheaply and you can have a supply adequate for health and comfort for very little more. You can prove this to your own satisfaction and without any large investment, by taking advantage of the R. G. & E. plan under which you rent an automatic water heater for \$1.00 per month, plus the cost of gas consumed.

Staggering Increases In Utility Taxes Present Serious Problem

Increased taxes and rising cost of all the essentials of living are a problem to most of us in our homes and the constantly narrowing margin between income and expenses adds to our financial worries. It has been a source of real satisfaction to the directors and officers of the Rochester Gas and Electric Corporation that in the service we render in the homes of our customers we have not contributed to this general increase in living expenses but instead, through rate reductions made since 1931, were able to save our customers more than \$1,600,000 in 1937.

Constantly increasing cost of taxes, materials and labor presents a serious problem to utility companies in their effort to continue to render adequate and efficient service at existing rates. The R. G. & E. tax bill for 1937 reached the staggering total of \$2,553,000, an increase of \$695,750 over 1936. Estimates of operating expenses for 1938.

with higher costs for practically everything used in the production and distribution of gas and electricity, indicate that it will be necessary for the Company to spend approximately \$1,100,000 more than it did in 1937, including an increase of \$225,000 in taxes and a jump of \$345,000 in the coal bill.

It is only through increased sales of gas and electricity and continually improved efficiency of operation that we have been able so far to meet rate reductions, mounting taxes and other increased costs.

Since 1929 the Company has spent for additions to plants and distribution systems approximately (\$19,000,000), nineteen million dollars, yet its net income for 1937 was about \$1,000,000 less than in 1929. A slowing down of Rochester industry and business would prove serious for the Company.
