Try Some of these Popular Holiday Recipes

There are so many favorite holiday recipes that it is difficult to make a choice but the R. G. & E. Home Service Department has selected a few that have won particularly wide popular acceptance and we pass them along to you. If you wish any advice or help with cooking or baking problems call Main 7070 and ask the Home Service Department for suggestions. They'll be delighted to help you and the service is free, of course.

Here are six recipes for which we have had many requests:

CHRISTMAS COCKTAIL

2 c cranberry juice 2 c orange juice
2 c pineapple juice sugar to taste (if desired)
(unsweetened)
sprigs of mint

Mix the first 4 ingredients, chill 2 to 3 hours in an automatic refrigerator and serve in glasses garnished with a sprig of mint.

CRANBERRY JELLY

2 lbs. cranberries sugar
3 c water

Cook cranberries and water until berries are soft. Strain through a jelly bag. Measure the juice and for every 2 c of juice, add 1 c sugar. Bring to the boiling point and cook as quickly as possible (5 to 6 minutes) until it jells. This may be tested with a candy thermometer, cooking to 220° F. Pour into hot, sterilized glasses and cover with hot, melted paraffin.

CROWN ROAST OF PORK

Temperature: 350° F. Time: 35 min. per lb.
Have butcher prepare a crown roast from a loin of pork. Fill center with stuffing. Place on a rack in a roasting pan and roast in a preheated oven. About 2¾ hours should be allowed for a 5 lb. roast. Serve on a platter garnished with halves of parboiled green peppers filled with diced buttered potatoes, sprinkled generously with paprika.

FROZEN EGGNOG

2 eggs 1 c heavy cream
¼ c sugar 1 t vanilla or
few grains salt rum or sherry flavoring

Beat eggs with sugar and salt until the sugar is dissolved and the mixture is thick and custard-like. Add the thickly beaten cream and flavoring. Pour into the trays of an automatic refrigerator and freeze until set. Serve in sherbet glasses.

MARSHMALLOW DIVINITY

2½ c sugar 8 marshmallows
⅔ c light corn syrup ½ t vanilla
½ c water ¼ c candied cherries
¼ t salt ½ c chopped nutmeats
2 egg whites

Place sugar, corn syrup, water and salt in saucepan. Cook, stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking until temperature reaches 260° F (a hard ball when tested in cold water). Pour over the stiffly beaten egg white. Add marshmallows and beat until stiff. Fold in vanilla, cherries and nuts and spread in a shallow pan. Cut in squares.

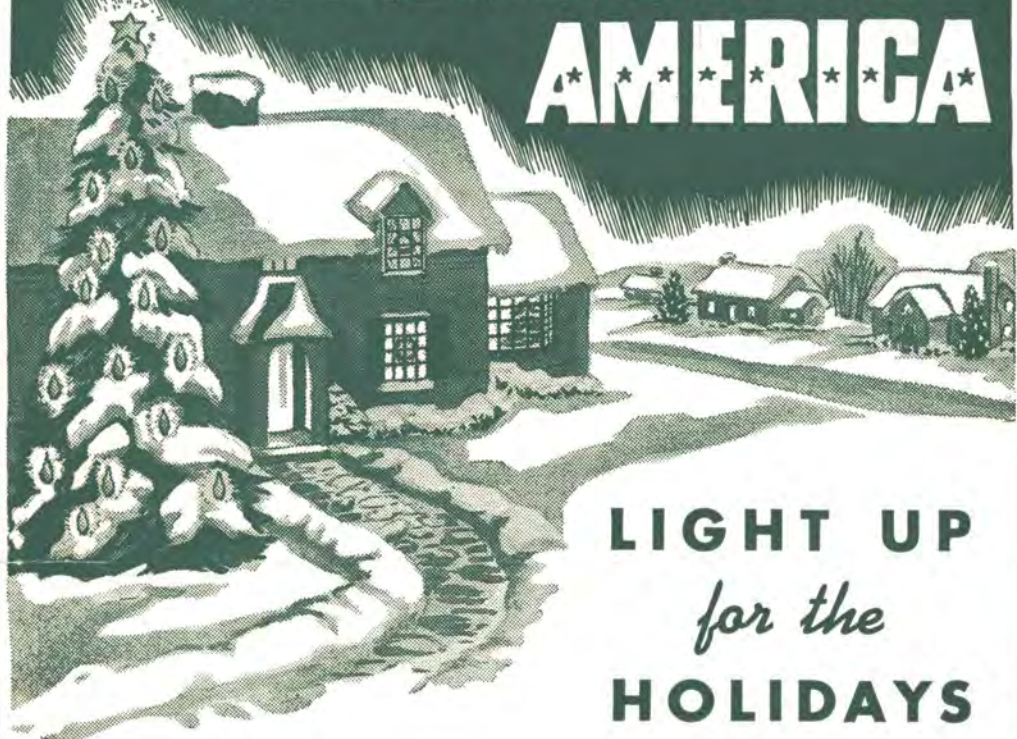
