Compensation for the long, weary hours spent in the garden appears on the table every time a meal is prepared. Bright red tomatoes, green beans, golden carrots, purple egg plant along with all the pastel shades in fruit such as peaches, plums, pears and apples help solve the problem of "what to have for dinner."

2. Beat egg whites until stiff, beat in sugar.

3. Add fruit mixture; beat well and fold in thickly beaten evaporated milk.

4. Pour into the trays of an automatic refrigerator and freeze 2 to 3 hrs.



For a hearty dinner-type salad try an Egg Stuffed Tomato—

1. Remove top slice and center from medium sized firm tomatoes.

2. Place a deviled egg in each tomato, garnish with salad dressing and chopped parsley or pickle.

3. Serve in greens with some potato sticks or chips and pass dressing.

HOT ROASTED EARS

1. Husk small roasting ears of corn and remove silk.

2. Cover with cold water and bring to the boiling point. Cook 2 minutes and drain.

3. Brush with butter or bacon fat.

4. Preheat broiler and place ears on rack. Turn ears as they brown.

For that extra cooling touch try this delicious dessert:

FRENCH PEACH ICE CREAM

1 c peach pulp	2 eggs
1 T lemon juice	2 T sugar
2/3 c sugar or honey	1 c evaporated milk
1/3 c top milk	

1. Mix the peach pulp, lemon juice, sugar, top milk and egg yolks. Beat well.

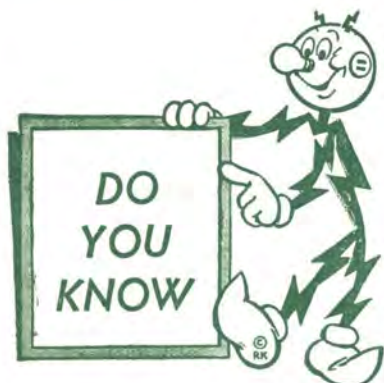
CANNING CENTER

It's Your Money They Want to Spend

On an equal basis no government project is ever operated as efficiently or economically as a business-managed enterprise.

after all, you, yourself, are Uncle Sam. If more and more government tax-exempt power projects are established they will force tax-paying companies out of business and the government will lose a huge amount of tax revenue. Governments have no money except what they get from the people in taxes so someone will have to make up that loss. That someone is you!

Are you going to let that happen just because certain groups want to wreck the American system that has given us the highest standard of living in the world?

WHAT PEOPLE WANT IN REMODELED HOMES

A recent survey by McCall's Magazine shows that of homes in need of major repairs 44.4 per cent want kitchen ventilation; 39.6 per cent want more electric convenience outlets; 33.9 per cent want garbage disposal; 33.6 per cent want electric dishwashers and 45.9 per cent want to replace present lighting fixtures.
