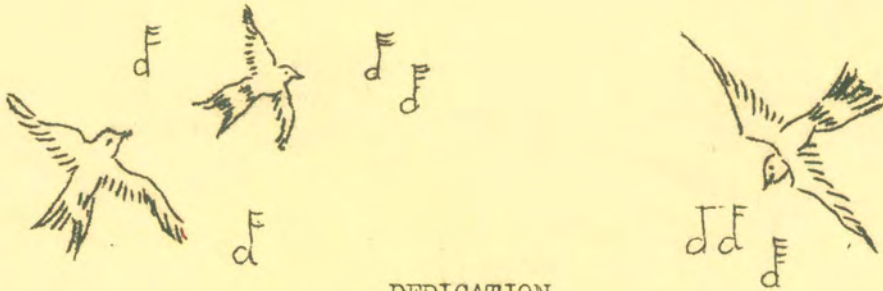

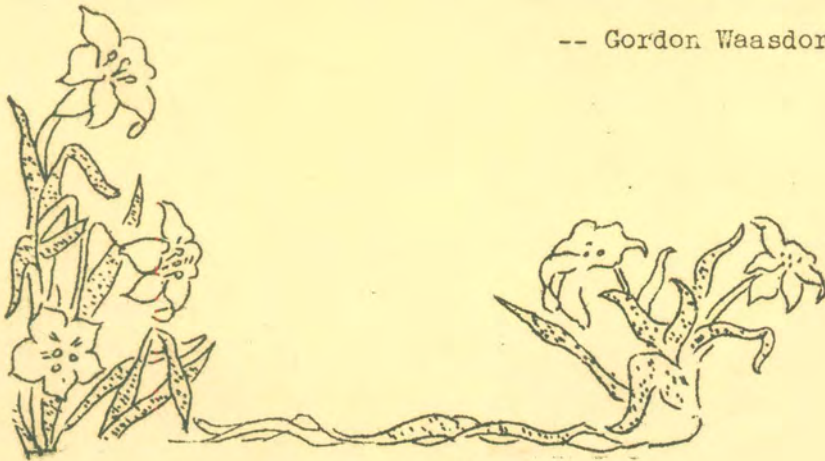
### DEDICATION

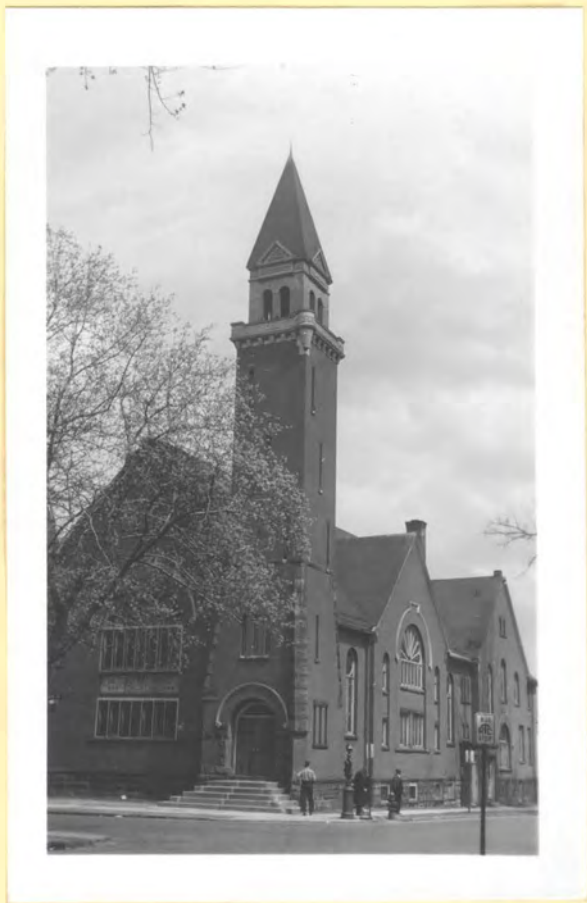
This booklet is dedicated to the memory of Mrs. Irene Biddle, under whose enthusiastic guidance the initial work was started.

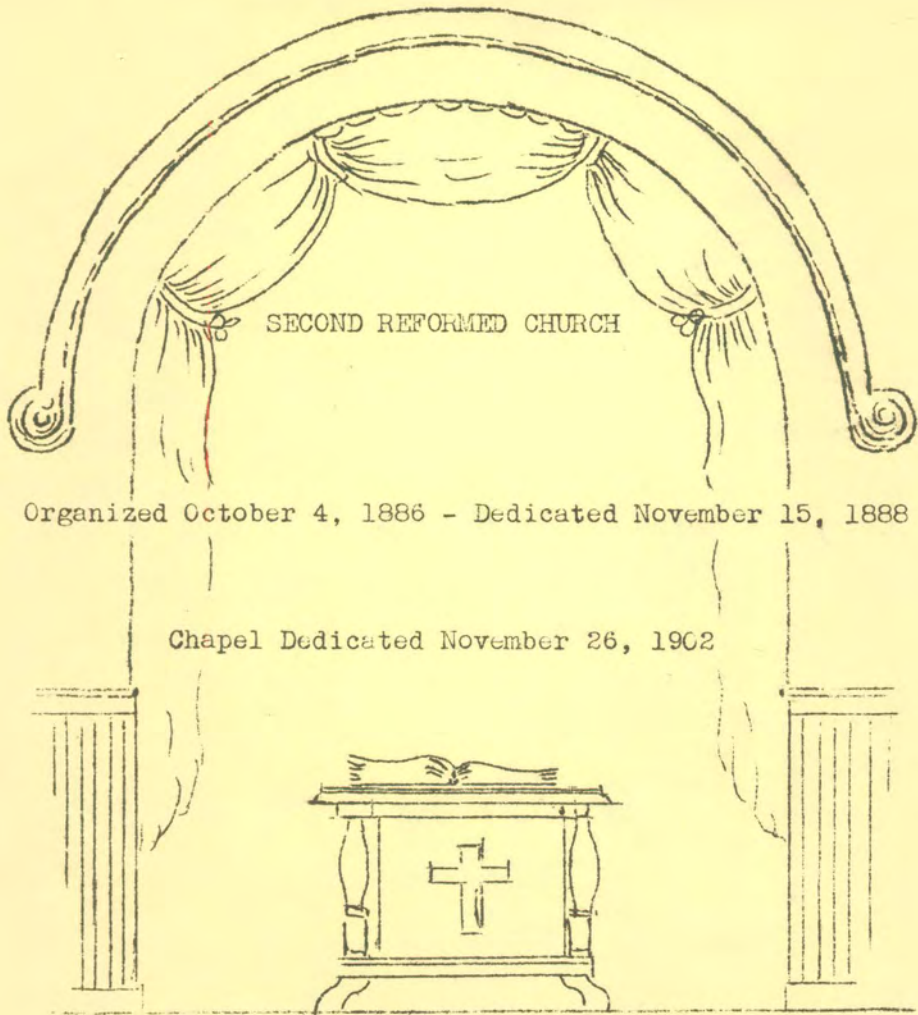
However, no tribute can adequately express the feeling of the Second Reformed Church for the labor of love that Irene gave so freely for the greater glory of God's Church.

## GLIMPSES INTO OUR PAST

The spirit of Second Reformed Church is the spirit of youth and progress. For it was in the summer of 1886 that the young people of the First Reformed Church of Rochester felt the necessity of having a new Church with services conducted in the English language. There were between 2000 and 3000 Holland people in the city, and our Mother, the First Reformed Church, felt this number amply sufficient to support two Churches. Aid was promised by the Board of Domestic Missions of the Reformed Church, and thus there came into existence an English speaking Dutch Reformed Church, known as the Second Reformed Church of Rochester. The Statue of Liberty, symbol of national freedom, and our Second Reformed Church, symbol of spiritual freedom, came into existence in the same month and the same year--a light which shines as a glorious gospel of freedom for this city

With the Rev. Peter DeBruyn presiding over the session, 28 members formed the nucleus in the organization of the Second Reformed Church. Their names are as follows:

## OUR MINISTERS THROUGH THE YEARS

called as the first Pastor and installed in May 1887. A lease for the building of the Unitarian Church at Cortland St. was secured and the Church worship was held in that place until the Second Reformed Church building was dedicated on November 15, 1888. The contractors were A. W. Hopeman and E. DeYoung. During the pastorate of the Rev. E. VanderHart, the development of the Church was tremendous, and while still anticipating a greater service among us, he was suddenly stricken with sickness and was taken to his Heavenly home on April 29, 1889. A Junior Christian Endeavor Society was organized during his pastorate which was the beginning of our extensive youth work.

The succeeding ministers were Rev. A. Vennema, Rev. T. W. Hopkins, Rev. W. H. Bates, Rev. C. M. Steffens. During the pastorate of Rev. John Lamar who came in 1898, plans were laid for the construction of our Sunday School building. After sufficient funds were raised, amounting to \$8,804--the cost of the structure, the building was completed and dedicated on November 26, 1902. The Rev. John Lamar served the Church well for fourteen years, after which he went in 1912 to Roseland, Illinois.

The Rev. Harry W. Noble was his successor and served for three years, after which he left us to accept a call to Jersey City. Dr. John A. Thurston, who came from Norwood Park, Illinois, became our pastor in 1917 until 1921. The Rev. Leonard Appledoorn then served the Church from 1922 to 1924. During the six years following, Dr. J. W. A. Stewart, the retired dean of the Rochester Colgate Divinity School, served as pastor. During this time, he was instrumental in securing \$1200 which made it possible for the congregation to burn their mortgage and be entirely free of debt.

Rev. Martin Punt became the pastor on July 17, 1930, coming directly from Western Theological Seminary. He



resigned in July 1942, going to Schuylerville, N. Y. Rev. M. Punt was instigator of the Sixtieth Anniversary Fund. He and his wife were dearly beloved by the people of the Second Church and left loving memories which will hold through all the years.

Rev. J. Foster Welwood was next called and served the Church until January 1, 1946. During his ministry, a Parsonage at 41 Macbeth St. was purchased by the congregation and the help of the Hopeman family. The Youth Fellowship was formed and is successfully being carried on at the present time. Mrs. Irene Biddle became Church Secretary and many activities were resumed in the Church because of her remarkable ability to carry on. Because of illness, she resigned in September 1946, and was taken to her Heavenly home December 23 of that same year.

#### A GREAT DECISION

Our Church was faced with a great decision--a decision which determined the end or the future of our Church. The question as to whether we should unite with the First Reformed Church was seriously and prayerfully considered. At a Congregational meeting in May of 1946 the congregation resolutely decided to make this a Church with a Future. There was a great challenge before the congregation. The entire building needed redecorating and renovating, both interior and exterior. Nearly \$2000 of the Sixtieth Anniversary Fund was available towards these projects which would cost approximately \$8000. With great determination the congregation decided to increase its pledges and budget, in view of increasing costs everywhere, and secure a pastor at an increased salary. The congregation was happy as with these decisions they looked forward to their Sixtieth Anniversary celebration and the prospering of their Church.



A unanimous call was extended to the Reverend Victor J. Maxam, Pastor of the Reformed Church of East Williamson, N. Y. He was installed as Pastor on June 12, 1946. He is a graduate of Hope College and Western Theological Seminary of Holland, Michigan. His previous pastorates were: Third Reformed Church, Holland, Michigan; Fairview Reformed Church, Fairview, Illinois; and, East Williamson Reformed Church, East Williamson, New York.

#### THE SIXTIETH ANNIVERSARY PROGRAM

On October 11, 1946, a large congregation of members and friends gathered for the Anniversary Dinner. Rev. Martin A. Punt, former Pastor and now at the Reformed Church of Hasbrouck Heights, N. J. was the main speaker. Dr. J. W. A. Stewart, who has since passed away, spoke a few words in reminiscence. The Sixtieth Anniversary Pageant was written by Mrs. Irene Biddle, and directed by Miss Margaret Glerum. This was successfully presented November 20th, 1946 to a large and appreciative audience. On November 24th the Pastor, Rev. Victor J. Maxam, presented an Anniversary sermon over radio station W H A M at 8:30 A.M. upon the subject "According to the Power That Worketh". During that week, Al Sisson had presented a beautiful tribute and congratulations to our Church, and especially in appreciation of the remarkable work of Mrs. Irene Biddle. At the Church Anniversary Rededication Service, the pastor preached upon the subject "The Church of the Future". The final service of the Sixtieth Anniversary Program was on November 27th, concluding with a Thanksgiving Anniversary Communion Candlelight Service.

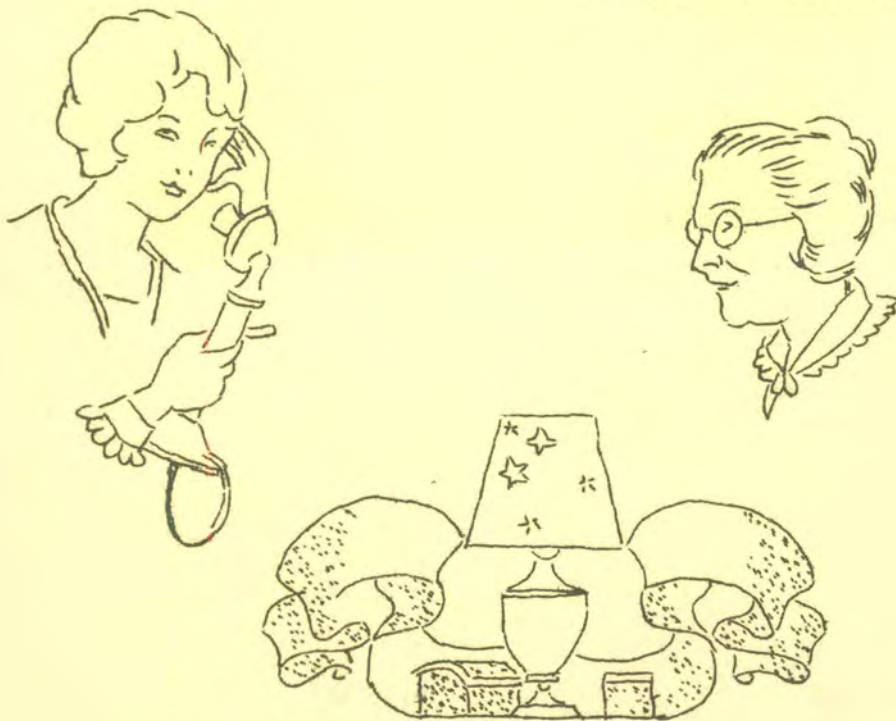
Due to the illness of Mrs. Irene Biddle, a new Church Secretary, Miss Jeannette Hyler, was appointed by the Consistory. The particular services of the Church Secretary are the printing of the weekly bulletin, sending them to shut-ins and absentees, keeping Church records,



sending out letters to the congregation and other clerical tasks. Following her resignation to accept a full-time secretarial job, Mary Michel and Helen Christ have been assisting the pastor.

A Board of Deaconesses has been appointed by the Consistory which has been of untold value in calling upon the shut-ins, and following up those interested in the Church by personal calls. The chairman is Miss Grace Barton, assisted by Mrs. Floyd Spencer, Mrs. Edward De Jonge, Mrs. John Keller, and Mrs. Wm. Verwey. Mr. Eugene Alhart, who is chairman of the Membership Committee of the Consistory is advisor and inspiration to this group. Their services will continue to have untold value.

## ORGANIZATIONS

### THE GREATER CONSISTORY

The governing body of the Church is the Consistory composed of Elders and Deacons. It is the good fortune of the Church to have some of the finest men of the city as members of this organization. Men they are who have the welfare of the Church always at heart and the Kingdom of God always as their goal. A wonderful spirit of harmony and love prevails. The Greater Consistory is composed of all who have at any time served in the past. The present membership of the Greater Consistory is as follows as shown in the picture on the opposite page: The bottom row: Elmer Van Almkerk, Raymond Stonewell, Chester Dirks, Marvin Sloane, Owen De Neve. The Rotary System was adopted at the Congregational Meeting of 1947. By this method two Elders and two Deacons are up for election, or re-election each year. It is necessary that one Elder and one Deacon be ineligible for one year, and may hold two consecutive terms with one year of ineligibility before, or after, these two terms. The advantages of this system are evident, for it trains a larger number in leadership and gains the co-operation of new men with new progressive ideas.



## LADIES AID SOCIETY

Under the leadership of Mrs. John A. Thurston, wife of the Pastor, the Ladies Aid Society was organized May 18, 1917. The ladies of the Church have always been very willing to assist the Consistory and the Congregation in many ways. Down through the years this organization has been the backbone of church activities. In addition it was always there when the need arose for extra funds at the end of the church year. The society is divided into chapters which are named as follows: Night Hawk Chapter, Sunshine Chapter, Wide Awake Chapter, Friendly Chapter, Royer Chapter, and the DeJonge Chapter. The Ladies Aid meets once a month--with dues ten cents at meeting time. The Chapter meetings are like family groups and a real source of pleasure to all and it does much to promote acquaintance, kindly friendship and a general spirit of good fellowship. Officers of the Ladies Aid are: Pres., Mrs. John Keller; Vice Pres., Mrs. Walter MacAllister; Secy., Miss Grace Barton; Treas., Mrs. Leonard Waasdorp.

## CHRISTIAN LEAGUE FOR SERVICE

This organization came into being during the time of Rev. Martin Punt's pastorate in 1932 with the able assistance of Mrs. M. Punt. The purpose of this society is to create interest in the Missionary enterprises of the Reformed Church and to acquaint the women of the Church with our work. With a growing membership and an excellent monthly attendance, this group has met a real need in our congregation. The officers are as follows: Pres., Mrs. Victor J. Maxam; Vice Pres., Mrs. Edward DeJonge; Secy., Mrs. Carrie Buff; Treas., Miss Castelle Havert.



## CLASS 29

Class 29 was organized October 17, 1896 in the old Chapel with a membership of 6. Wilbur Fridley served as teacher for 14 years. The Class grew simultaneously with the membership of the Church to a total of 25 members. Mr. John Poppink then took charge of the class, and during the time he was the teacher, it had 64 members. During that period the class was very active, helping the Church in many ways, financially and spiritually. After the resignation of Mr. Poppink, Mr. Seward Summers became the teacher and for a number of years we enjoyed his good fellowship. After his resignation, Mr. Leonard Waasdorp and the boys themselves became the leaders. Rev. J. Foster Welwood took charge when he became Pastor, and now with Rev. V. J. Maxam as our leader, the opportunity for Bible instruction is available for any men who wish to attend. The Class has contributed to the Christian Church at large. Among the many active workers, are one minister, a Y.M.C.A. worker, Elders and Deacons, Sunday School teachers and superintendents. We are known as one of the oldest Sunday School classes in the city.

## THE DEJONGE SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS

One of the strong Sunday School classes is called the DeJonge Class, so named because Mrs. Edward DeJonge has served as teacher for the past 17 years, the age also of the class. The meetings are held the second Tuesday night of each month. They have contributed nearly \$600 to the Sixtieth Anniversary Fund. The formal organization of the class took place seven years ago with the election of officers. Those now in office are: Pres., Mrs. Betty Rapp; Vice Pres., Mrs. Arlene Spencer; Secy., Miss Mintoria Noble; and Treas., Miss Jeanne Johnson.



## THE CHURCH CHOIR

Among the most faithful institutions of the Church is the Choir. From Sunday to Sunday, year after year they have continued as a most inspirational part of the worship services. Mr. Marvin Sloane, Chairman of the Music Committee of the Consistory and also a member of the choir, supervises the activities. Mr. Walter Kau of the Eastman School of Music is the Organist-Director.

## THE WAASDORP CLASS

This class is 42 years old. Mrs. William Vandewalle was the teacher for 35 years. Mrs. Leonard Waasdorp is now the instructor and has successfully carried on through 7 years. The class does a great deal of benevolent work for the Church and others. It stands always ready to help in whatever capacity it can. Mr. Gordon Waasdorp has been assisting Mrs. L. Waasdorp, his mother, in the past year as teacher.



## THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The future of any Church is in its Sunday School. Under the direction and teaching of many capable leaders, a large number of young lives have been guided into Christian usefulness and service. Mr. Clarence Alhart has served as Superintendent for many years, with Mr. Gordon Waasdorp as assistant. Miss Jennie Gribbroek is Secretary-Treasurer. At the teacher's meetings held monthly, Miss Margaret Glerum serves in the capacity of Recording Secretary. The School is fortunate in having an abundant supply of talent for Sunday School teachers and officers.

A bit of pioneering work is being done by the Sunday School in the field of visual education. On the third Sunday of each month, a religious and Biblical sound moving picture film is presented. The attendance of the Sunday School has been increasing rapidly since the Community Canvass by the workers of the Church.

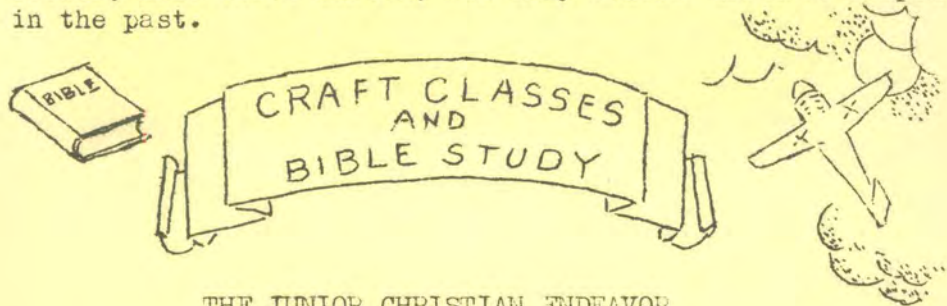


THE HISTORY

## YOUTH FELLOWSHIP

Every Friday night the songs of the children from the neighborhood may be heard in the basement of the Church. One of the contributions of the Church to the immediate community is the Youth Fellowship. From 7:00 - 8:00 P.M. services of a religious nature are held for the children. Craft classes are held from 8:00 - 9:00 P.M. The Youth Fellowship was organized during the time of Rev. J. Foster Welwood's pastorate. Mr. Chester Dirks is Superintendent, having the able assistance of capable leaders of the Church. Among those who have dedicated every Friday night to this work with the children are: Mr. and Mrs. Chester Dirks, Mr. and Mrs. Warren DeNeve, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bluhm, Miss Castelle Havert, Mr. Gordon Waasdorp, Mrs. Edward DeJonge, Mr. Vernon Mesick, Mrs. Charles Moore, Mrs. Robert Dykins, Mrs. Hawleigh Decker, Miss Grace Barton, and many others who have helped in the past.



### THE JUNIOR CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

The Junior Christian Endeavor has been organized as a part of the Youth Fellowship Program and includes those from the ages of 10-13. Mr. Chester Dirks, sponsor of the group, gives them his kindly advice and helps them in their discussions. This group has much to look forward to in the development of leadership and in the deepening of the spiritual life of the children.



## SENIOR CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

With the coming of Rev. V. J. Maxam in 1946, the Senior Christian Endeavor was organized and has become a strong and flourishing youth society. It is comprised of those young people and married young people who are tremendously interested in C. E. work. The group is affiliated with the Monroe County C. E. Union and has received its charter from them. Our Church is honored in having Mr. Eugene Alhart as President of the State C. E. Union, and Vice President of the International C. E. Union, having served in these capacities the last two years.

The C. E. meets every other Sunday night for supper at 6:00 P.M. followed by the devotional services. The attendance in the last two years has been excellent. Present officers of the society are: Pres., Robert Alhart; Vice Pres., Helen Christ; Secy., Mary Michel; and Treas. Mrs. Vernon Mesick.

One of the annual events is the Fun Night--a miscellaneous program of humorous skits, songs, and plays, which is put on by the young people. The offerings received at these performances are given to the Church.





## THE CHURCH OF THE FUTURE

Once upon a time there was a church that grew old with the community. The building became shabby and cold; young people did not seem to be available and with a dying spirit, the church was sold. The church, as well as Christian influence in that community, was soon boarded up.

The Second Reformed Church of Rochester may have experienced some of the difficulties of the boarded up church, but it never was boarded up. It may have reached a point of discouragement, but it believed in the future. With a living spirit, it has gone forward. Within a few years after buying a parsonage, the church was physically restored. All the slate on the roof was removed and new roofing was put on the church, the steeple and the Sunday School chapel. The tower was reenforced, windows repaired, and the bricks and trim were painted on the outside. Young people aided in planting shrubs around the side and front of the church. The inside was completely redecorated. New modern lighting fixtures for the choir and Sunday School rooms were a marked improvement. The Sunday School Chapel received a new plastered ceiling, the pastor's study was refinished, new cupboards were installed in the kitchen and a men's room installed in the basement. Improvements were made on the heating system, and many other details received due consideration. These things helped the church approach its original beauty.

Consecrated leadership, guided by an inspiring pastor, stirred up new young life in the church. For five years the Sixtieth Anniversary Fund had made the membership conscious of needed changes. Today we can again say, "How amiable is Thy tabernacle, oh Lord of Hosts". Today with increasing membership, the Second Reformed Church looks to the future.



A dream of yesterday is for the church with the lighted steeple. "A city set upon a hill cannot be hid". In an every-member canvass of the neighborhood we found that many of our neighbors thought that our church had been closed. Today they know through invitation, youth work, and pastoral visitation that "The Friendly Church" may be their church--to lead them to the Church and God. Tomorrow, the steeple may shine with a Guiding Light; it may even sing with heavenly chimes. Let the light shine out and may the church also minister to let Christ's light shine into the hearts of men.

The Church of the future will continue to emphasize youth work. It has embraced Christian Endeavor, and Christian Endeavor will train its leadership for tomorrow. We read "Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it." That is our challenge, it is our Master's desire. The church of the future is that church which has not failed its youth today. Our kindergarten and our primary department and Sunday School is alert to use God's best teaching tools. Training for teachers, visual education for the pupils, and even television have great potential possibilities. Seeing our missionaries at work, we will bind up into an ever-increasing fellowship and oneness with Him. May the knowledge that God sees our every movement lead us to please Him ever in word and deed.

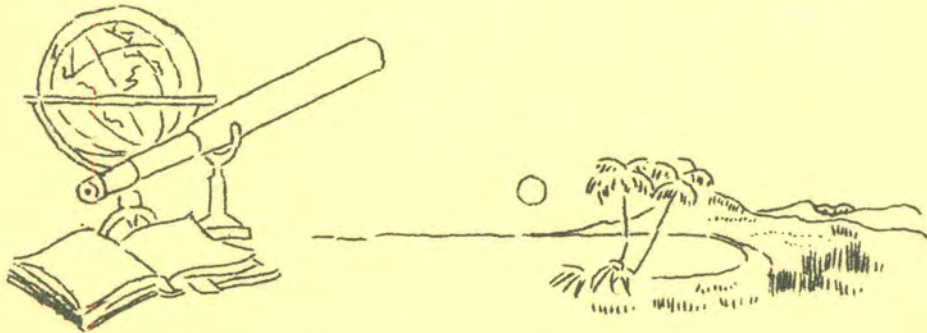
