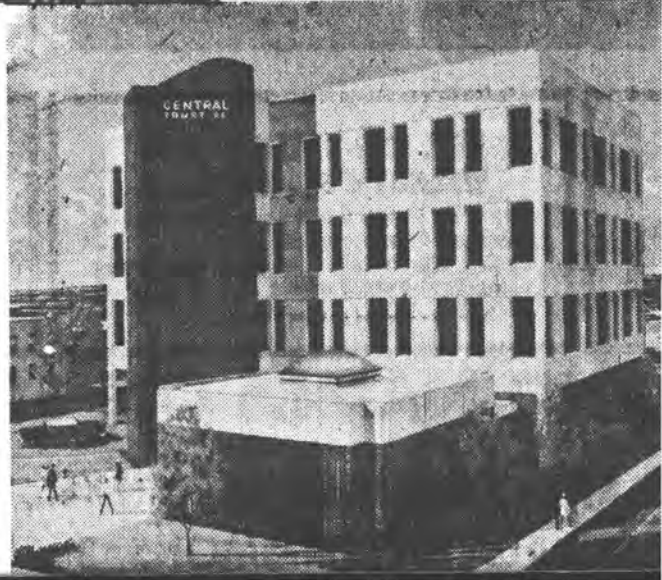
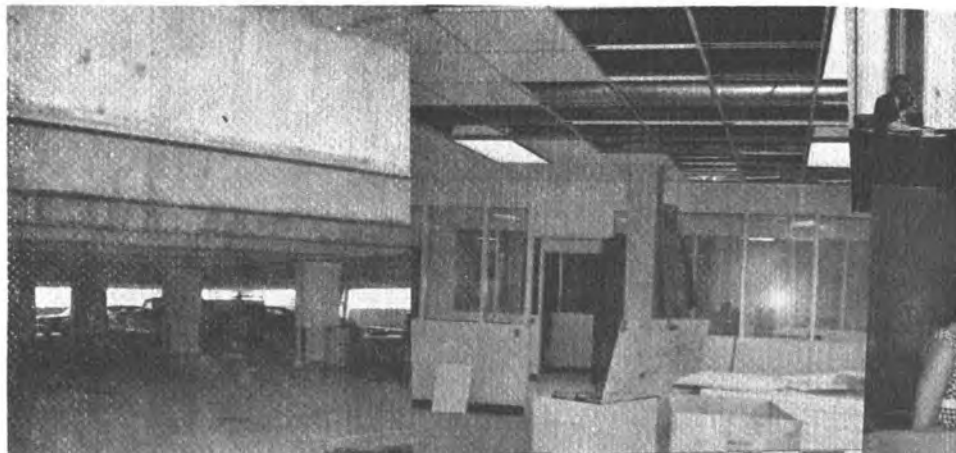

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I'm delighted to accept the invitation of your Editor to address you through the medium of the TRIANGLE NEWS, especially at this particular point in time. Just a couple of weeks ago, on June 1, Central Trust Company marked the first anniversary of its affiliation with Charter New York Corporation, and it is most appropriate that I report to you the results of our first year, and more importantly some of our plans for the future.

I will quote but a few statistics, merely to illustrate more graphically the degree of our complete recovery from the immediate effects of the spin-off last June. You will recall we spun off four branches, \$29 million in assets and approximately one hundred employees,

I'm pleased to report to you that we recouped 116% of the assets spun off and increased 158% in the loan category. We accomplished this while at the same time maintaining previous profit levels. Although our staff is still smaller than it was before spin-off, we anticipate significant growth as we move in the months ahead to expand our network of branches and expand already existing departments to better service our customers. It will not be too many years before we become a bank of five hundred employees.

In order to prepare our management group to effectively handle the growth we anticipate, we have started on our plan to reorganize our senior management into three or four groups, each led by a Group Vice President. In January of this year we formed the first group by consolidating the Commercial Loan Department, Consumer Loan Department and Mortgage Department into a Loan Administration Group headed by Group Vice President Al Tortoretti. The formation of Group II has just been announced, combining the activities of the Trust Department and the Investment Department under the direction of Group Vice President Larry Broadhurst. There will be further regrouping in the immediate months ahead. We believe this new system will enable me to delegate more responsibility and authority to the senior officers of the bank, which we feel is

vitaly important as we quickly approach becoming a \$300 million plus bank, if we are to continue to pursue our aggressive competitive stance in the market place.

Our affiliation with Charter has freed us of our past perennial concern over the liquidity and capital position of our bank - - common problems of a fast growing bank - - so that we can now devote most of our attention and efforts to pursuing and developing new business and to expanding imaginative and effective programs like Centrachek, mobile home financing and auto agent plans, interim construction financing and customized commercial loan arrangements for our business customers. Charter has promised us the funds and assistance needed to pursue these plans and we, in turn, have committed ourselves to make available to our sister banks in Charter the special expertise we possess in many areas. We have, in fact, already started a statewide mobile home program and loan participation plan involving other units of the Charter group. We are confident that this kind of cooperative effort will increase in the years ahead.

A word now about our branch expansion program presently underway. As you know, we are in process of opening our new East Avenue-Winton Road Branch and

Operations Center. This impressive \$2.5 million structure will provide us with facilities sorely needed. Soon we will open a new branch in Goodman Street Plaza--tangible proof of our commitment to the inner city of Rochester as well as the fast growing metropolitan area. We are in the midst of negotiations for a new office in the Main-Clinton area to replace the office spun off to Bankers Trust Company. We also have plans for an office in the Town of Gates.

Recently we announced our plans to acquire the First National Bank of Painted Post which has approximately \$10 million in assets. We hope to complete this merger by the end of the year. This will give us access to Corning, a most important city in our banking district.

I have attempted to illustrate the kind of growth we anticipate for Central Trust Company which will, of course, mean new opportunities for all of you. I am sure that you are well qualified to take advantage of these opportunities as they arise and meet the challenges presented to you. In summary, management is confident and excited about the future of Central Trust Company, and I sincerely hope that you - - the backbone of the bank - - feel the same confidence and sense of excitement.

Also in the Henrietta area, Trust Officer Gerry Combs recently was elected fourth Vice President on the newly formed Henrietta Town Planning Council.

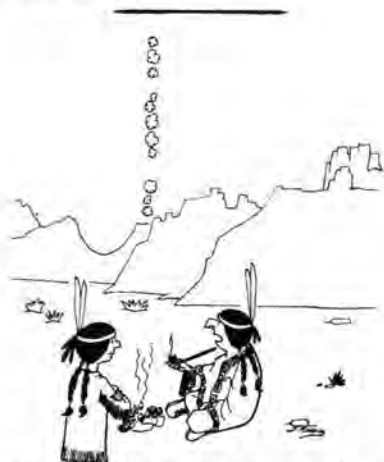

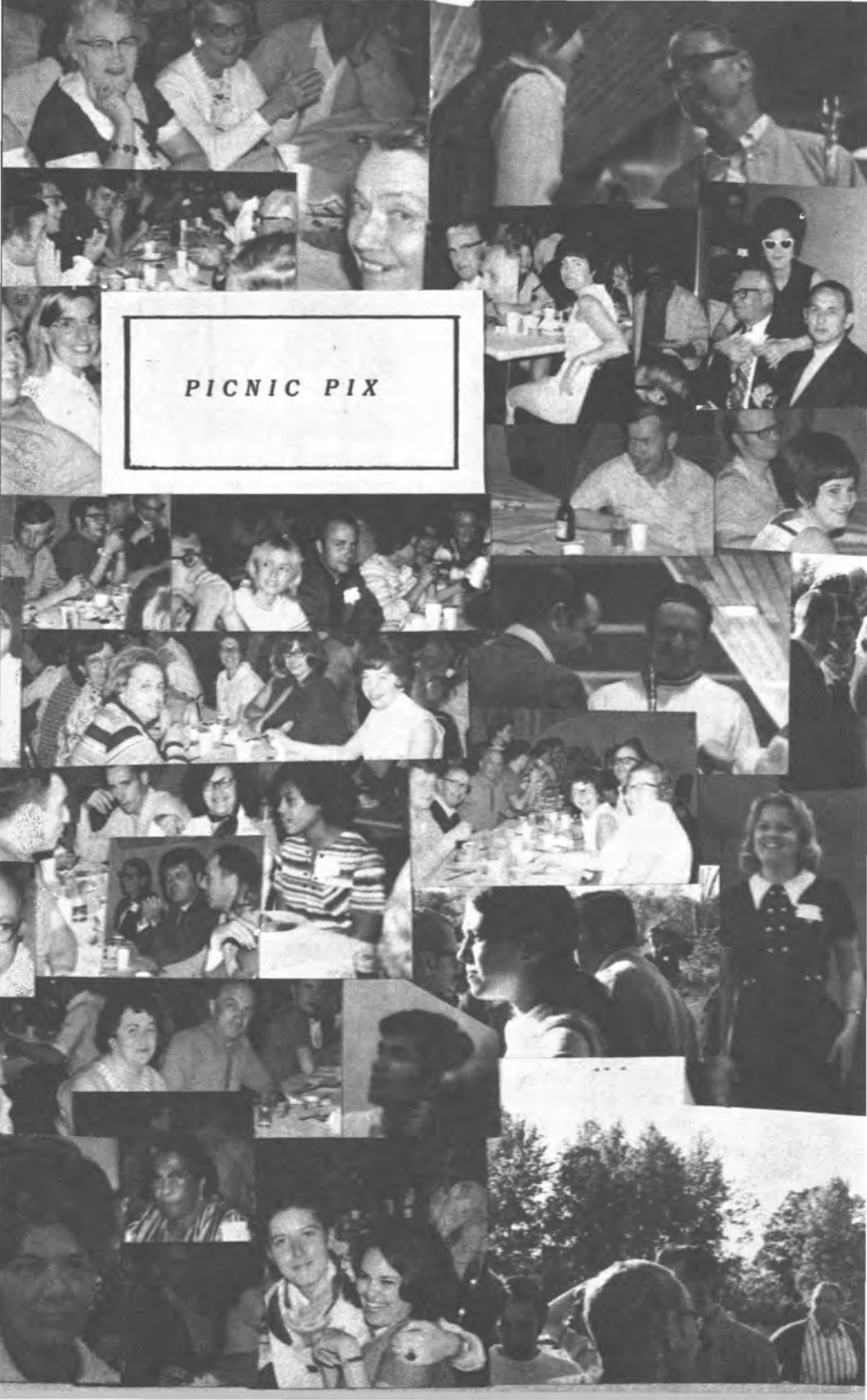

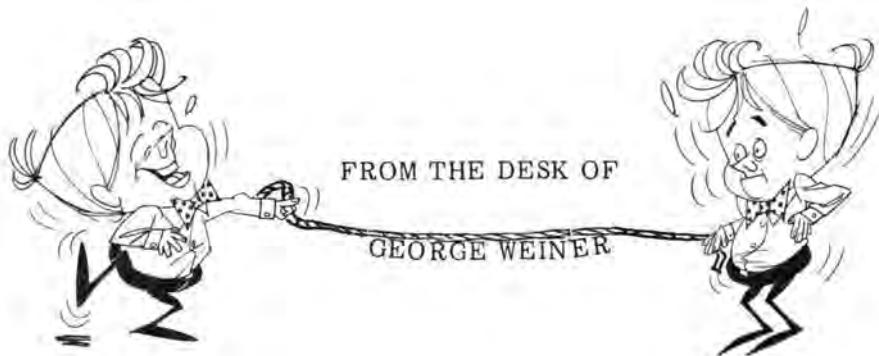
